Distraction Of The Banana Crop

Kingston, Ja., Aug. 31. Information collected from all parts of the island respecting the damage done by the hurricane of the fifteenth instant, indicates that for all practical purposes, this year's banana crop has been completely destroyed, the crop for 1917 reduced by fifty per cent and barring further blows, the full output from all plantations will not be in effect before 1918. The serious nature of the situation, which has been brought about will be recognized, when it is stated that bananas represent fully sixty per cent of the island exports.

Thrift Campaign For Canadians

Ottawa, September 7—The Minister of Finance foreshadows a thrift campaign for this fall to promote greater national saving: Canada, he says, must be prepared to find the money for munitions and supplies purchased here, there being the closest possible connection between the ability to finance and the getting of international orders.

Opportunity for desirable investment of national savings in Government loan issues will be presented. Details of the new war loan will be announced next week.

BRITISH EXPEL THE BULGARIANS

London, Sept. 11—The British troops, in their advance across the Struma, in the region of Lake Tahnos, have driven the Bulgarians from four villages, says a war office statement on the operations in Macedonia, issued tonight. The British also repulsed strong Bulgarian counter-attacks. The announcement follows: "Our detachments crossed the Struma yesterday afternoon at Nechori and several places about Lake Tahnos. "After considerable opposition we expelled the enemy from the following villages: Oraorman, east of Bajraktarmah, upper and lower Guedell and Nevolyen. The enemy counter-attacked strongly, but was repulsed with the loss of prisoners, the number of which has not yet been ascertained."

THE QUEBEC BRIDGE COLLAPSED.

Centre Span Went Down Carrying to Death About Ten Workmen.

Quebec, September 11—With everything running smoothly, engineers, bridgemen and spectators congratulating each other that within a very short time the St. Lawrence river would be spanned by one of the most magnificent bridges in the world the well-laid carefully thought-out plans of the foremost engineers of the country, on which they had placed their professional reputations, were suddenly ruthlessly thwarted, and the massive centre span, weighing 5,100 tons, swayed to one side, wavered for an instant, then diving end foremost, in an instant disappeared from view, leaving scarcely a ripple on the water, and carrying with it about fourteen men, ten of whom have yet to be accounted for.

Four or five men at work on the top of the span were hurled many feet into the river. The rest were carried down. The launches and tugs gathered below the bridge site came swiftly to the rescue, but only a few rescues could be effected.

The cause of the accident has not been officially stated. Of scores of spectators who described the terrible scene, the stories agree that the failure of one of the hydraulic jacks was responsible. The sideways strain brought too great stress on the span, and the steel gave way.
