Chinese Children Trained for a Life of Degration in San Francisco Dens.

Chinese Unideren Francisco Dense.

A San Francisco despatoh says: The fact is now pretty well established that Chinese girls are secretly sold in this city for slaves. For years Miss Culberson, who is executive head of the Perebyterian Mission at No. 993 Sacramento street, had dared much to eave Chinese girls and women from actual slavery and enforced dogradation. Her life has been threatened by highbinders repeatedly; but she has never faltered in her work. The home has soreened about 300 femiles, of which, it is claimed, nearly all were slaves, possessing a moneyed value of from \$500 to \$2,000.

Attention has been attracted to the home during the past few days by a case pending in court. Woon Tein, a Chinese, girl 11 years old, was resoured from a man who bought her of her father. The father a few years ago lost his wife and four children by death. The fifth child, little Woon Tein, shen aged 6, was cold to Kum Mah, a Chinese procuress. The father then salled for China, leaving Woon Tein in the sole care and mercy of Kum Mah. The price the father received for his daughter paid his passage back to China.

Woon Tein was found at Kum Mah's claim in Bartlett alley. It was discovered that she was cent daily by Kum Mah to a place of ill repute on errands. The girl was then arrested and placed in the charge of Mice Culberston. Kum Mah immediately began a stroggle for her possession, and the case is still pending.
