DID NOT START HERE.

CANARDS AS TO THE CATTLE DISEASE DISPROVED.

Dr. Law Gives Result of His Inquiries-Agricultural Committee Asks \$1,000,000 to Fight Dis-

Ithaca, N.Y., Dec. 12 .- Dr. James Law of Cornell Veterinary College, who for the past few weeks has been working in conjunction with the Federal authorities for the suppression of foot and mouth disease among the cattle of New England, arrived in Ithaca from New England. He stated that the disease was well under control, and that the authorities had not yet arrived at conclusions as to the origin. It was practically certain, he said, that the contagion did not originate at Alberta, Canada, as was at first supposed. A rigid examination of the docks at Montreal indicated that the disease did not come from Canada. Dr. Law has not formed any conclusion as to the origin of the disease. He stated that the con-tagion could be stamped out only by co-operation of farmers in in-
