## CANADIAN SKIPPER OUTDOES HIS RIVAL

the spinaker run home on the third leg.

**EASILY BEAT MILWAUKEE.**  
It was said to be her best wind, but on the second leg the Invader increased her lead on the Milwaukee from two minutes, 13 seconds to over four minutes. The Invader turned the second buoy at 1:29:12; the third buoy at 1:36:5, finishing at 2:49:01. The triangular course was covered leaving buoys to port.

Commodore Shaw refused to make any kick on the decision of the judges, but Skipper Thompson was wrathful. "The invader was not on the wind and close hauled," he declared. "We had filled out on the starboard tack, have come close to the buoy on the port tack, and have crowded us right on the buoy. We were both on the starboard tack."

Skipper Thompson declares that the Invader should have been disqualified under the rule provided against any yacht compelling another to foul a buoy or causing another to luff or bear away to avoid fouling. Skipper Pynchon of the Illinois, admitted that there was a question about the foul, though having at first been against the Invader. The consensus of opinion was that the Cadillac's skipper had taken a long chance that would have been considered a very bad trick had it worked successfully, but had failed in it. The judges said that their decision against the Cadillac had been unanimous without any discussion whatever. They were positive that Jarvis was sailing close hauled, and decided in his favor on the ground that he had the right of way because of being on the starboard tack. They considered the Cadillac as being on the port tack at the time of the foul, as the Cadillac approached the Invader on the port tack and only came about at the last minute.

Tom Chivers expects to return to Detroit tonight, and his place in the Cadillac's crew is to be taken by Harry Higginbotham.

**THE RULES.**  
Chicago, August 13.—If Captain Thompson, of the Cadillac, enters a protest against the Invader on account of the foul that occurred as both yachts were crossing the line for the start, it will undoubtedly be on the grounds that the Invader was crowding him on the buoy and that he had gone about on the starboard tack to avoid the collision, he would have fouled the buoy himself. The authority for this would be section 12 of racing rule 26, which states that the Yacht Racing Union of the Great Lakes, under which these international races are being sailed. This rule provides that, when two yachts, both without tacking, are about to pass each other on the required side, then the outside yacht must give the inside yacht room to pass clear of the mark.

The judges, however, may apply section 12 of rule 26, instead of this rule applies to a yacht approaching shore shoal, rock, etc., and cannot go clear by altering her course without fouling another yacht, then the latter shall, upon being hailed by the former, at once give her sea room by tacking or bearing away, and the former shall also tack or bear away, as nearly the same time as possible; but, should such obstruction be a mark of the course, a yacht shall not force another to tack, under the provisions of this rule.

**JARVIS' COMMENT.**  
Capt Jarvis of the Invader probably will have his protest on section 2 of rule 26, which provides that "when both yachts are close hauled, the yacht with the wind on the port side shall keep clear."

It is a rather complicated case and will undoubtedly bring out strong arguments on both sides, especially as, if the race is given to the Invader, it greatly lessens Cadillac's chance for the cup. The Invader has two races to her credit and but one more to win would have nearly a certainty with the present weather outlook for tomorrow.

Capt Jarvis said after he got ashore that he felt no satisfaction in getting a cup race in this way, but that he was pleased that his boat had had an opportunity to beat the Milwaukee. Judge Warner, speaking officially, gave it out that the unfortunate incident was Capt. Thompson's own fault and that the judges had no course open to them but to disqualify the defender.

Commodore Gooderham of the Royal Canadian Yacht club said he regretted sincerely that such a thing had happened, and he added, "More particularly, as I think the Invader would have won anyhow."
