A pitched battle has been fought at Bialozero, between troops and peasants led by a village schoolmaster. The authorities fear the agitation will spread to the entire northern part of Russia and seriously interfere with the transport of grain, oil, coal and wood to St. Petersburg.

The recent introduction of tagboats on the Mary Canal to replace the towlines hauled by peasants, occasioned great excitement. Bands of peasants strung ropes across the canal and threw stones at the tugboats in efforts to interfere with the navigation of the waterway. Rural guards dispersed the rioters with some loss of life, and troops were detailed to patrol the canal.
