BISHOP OF HURON DEAD.

His Lordship Had Suffered Stroke of Paralysis Friday.

London, Oct. 20.—His Lordship M. C. Baldwin, Bishop of Huron, who has been very ill for some days, passed away yesterday morning. He has been ill since last Friday and never regained consciousness.

The Right Rev. Maurice Scollard Baldwin is the fourth son of the late John Spread Baldwin, of Toronto, and was born in that city, June 21, 1836. He was ordained deacon in 1860 and priested the following year by the late Bishop Cronyn, taking a curacy at St. Thomas and subsequently the incumbency of St. Paul's, Port Dover. In a few years he went to Montreal, where his earnest eloquence gained him a high reputation. He became rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Dean of Montreal in 1879 and third Bishop of Huron in 1883. Dr. Baldwin belonged to the evangelistic school among churchmen, and his practical piety has won many tributes. He is the author of two volumes and has identified himself with the Lord's Day Alliance, and the Western Bible Society.

Killed in Runaway.

Dutton, Oct. 20.—William Campbell about 20 years old, second son of Archibald Campbell, of the township of Dunwich, was killed yesterday. He and his brother were drawing wood to Dutton with two teams. While the unfortunate lad was descending a short but steep hill the front stakes gave way, letting the load slide forward, carrying the young man with it. The horses ran away when the wood struck them. The boy fell under the wagon, the front wheel passing diagonally over his chest. He was carried to the nearest house and expired in about half an hour after the accident. His father and mother were away from home attending the funeral of their uncle, the late Malcolm Campbell of Ekfrid.

C.P.R. Must Pay.

Brookville, Oct. 20.—There was concluded in the High Court here yesterday, before Judge Anglin, the trial of an action brought by Mark Forsythe, of Kempsville, C.P.R., against the Canadian Pacific Railway, to recover \$7,000 damages for personal injuries sustained by reason of an accident while driving over one of the company's crossings, near Kempsville Junction, Aug. 24, 1903. A verdict of \$4,000 was rendered in favor of the plaintiff. The C.P.R. solicitor signified his intention of entering an appeal.

While Cutting Kindling.

Windsor, Oct. 20.—While splitting kindling at his home Tuesday, Judge McHugh met with a serious accident. A rusty nail in the end of a piece of board penetrated one of his knees and inflicted a painful wound. The injured knee grew worse. He is now confined to the house and precautions are being taken against blood poisoning. Attorney Davis will be acting judge until Judge McHugh is able to take the bench again.

Brakeman Killed.

Montreal, Oct. 20.—One man was killed and three badly injured early yesterday morning in a collision between two gravel trains on the main line of the C. P. R., near Montreal Junction, five miles west of the city. One train ran into the rear of the other, and Brakeman McMahon was killed, while Fireman Hart had a leg broken, Conductor Myers an arm broken and Engineer Draper an arm and leg broken.

Died Aged 102.

Cornwall, Oct. 20.—Christopher Johnson, of the second concession of Northborough has passed away in his 102nd year. He was a native of Scotland, but came to Canada in his youth. He was wonderfully active and physically strong till a year or so ago, and was about the house the day of his death.

MODE OF PROCEEDURE

Bishop Baldwin, the most highly revered gentleman connected with the English Church, is dead. He died at 11 o'clock last night.

M. Wilson, K. C., who is a member of the Executive Committee of the Diocese, of which the Bishop was chairman, has received notice that a meeting will be called to-morrow evening at 8 o'clock at Bishop Cronyn Hall, London, to elect a chairman to administer the affairs of the diocese until a new bishop is elected. The constitution provides that in the event of the death of the chairman, that another chairman must be elected pending the election of a new bishop. Then a meeting will be called, after one month's notice and before the lapse of six weeks from the date of the Bishop's death, for the election of a bishop to fill the see. After the bishop's election the fact is certified to by the House of Bishops, and in the absence of any impediment three bishops of the House of Bishops consecrate the bishop elect to the office.
