It may interest the public, to know that one man in the employ of a big jewelry firm in that city spends three days of every week in visiting private residences, business houses, and factories, to wind up the big old clocks that are kent as heirlooms or factories, to wind up the big out clocks that are kept as heirlooms or curiosities in these places. Half of his time every week is spent in making the round of these places, and winding and regulating their old timepieces. He says that the majority of the clocks keep remarkably good time, too, when one takes into consideration the fact that they have recorded the flight of ages for so long.
