##### Italian Implicated in Mimico Murder Remanded Until Thursday.

Toronto Junction, Sept. 25.—Before Magistrate Ellis on Saturday, Bero Bruno was charged with the murder of Amos Marlow at Mimico on Friday night. The other five Italians were held as accessories. They were all remanded until Thursday next, when they will appear at the City Hall court at 11 o'clock.

According to a despatch from Brockville, Marlow frequently appeared in Police Court there charged with drunkenness, and also served a six months' term in the Central, resulting from the same weakness. He did not return, but relatives there understood he was doing well in Western Ontario. He was about 35 years old and unmarried. He leaves four brothers and two sisters.
