Karachi, India—The Karachi Chamber of Commerce addressed a letter recently to the railway board inquiring what arrangements have been arrived at in regard to the conversion to the broad gauge of the Hyderabad-Kuchman road section of the Jodhpur-Bikaner railway, and the linking up of Kuchman road and Delhi by a broad gauge line of railway. The letter stated that the Chamber had already expressed its cordial agreement with the proposal to link Delhi with Karachi by means of a broad gauge trunk railway, via Jodhpur and Hyderabad, and expressed the hope that as the project was now well advanced the work of conversion to the broad gauge of the Hyderabad-Kuchman road section of the Jodhpur-Bikaner railway would shortly be commenced.

UNIVERSITIES ARE TO BE REOPENED

PROFESSOR POINTS OUT THE NECESSITY OF CONTINUING EDUCATION OF UNDERGRADES

London, Sept. 30—Replying to a letter from Sir Cyprian Bridge in which he, Sir Cyprian, had urged that the universities ought not to reopen next term, Dr. C. H. Firth, regius professor of modern history at Oxford, points to several reasons why such a course would be inadvisable. "While I sympathize with the spirit of Sir Cyprian Bridge's letter," Dr. Firth writes, "I do not think he fairly represents the position of the universities. There are good reasons why their educational work should be continued next term, in spite of the war. In the newer universities, such as Manchester, Liverpool, and Sheffield, half, or more than half, of the students are under the age of 19, since they usually enter when they are about 17. "In Oxford and Cambridge the age of entry is later, but in both there are a certain number of undergraduates under the age of 19, and to these must be added the number of those 'unfit' for service. Their teaching must be provided for, even if all who are fit to enlist to do so. Further, Dr. Firth points out that the university in a place like Oxford is a great employer of labor, and that the cessation of the employment it provides would be a calamity to both places. "No doubt," he says, "the business of education will be carried on at a loss next term, and possibly for many more terms, but in spite of difficulties it is necessary that it should go on." Proceeding, Dr. Firth says that in Oxford he believed the number of undergraduates in residence next term will be reduced by about one-half. "The Officers Training Corps consisted," he says, "of about 900 men, and all of these who are wanted will presumably be employed. In addition to this a certain number of undergraduates are officers or privates in territorial regiments belonging to their counties, and will be serving with them. A number of others since the war began have enlisted in various units. I hear of new instances every day." Going on to give examples illustrative of the patriotic activity at present being displayed by the universities, Dr. Firth points out that at Oxford the colleges have been employed as barracks for the local territorials, the cricket grounds used as drilling grounds, and the examination schools turned into a hospital. "There is no sign of spathy or indifference," he adds, "amongst undergraduates or dons, so far as my observation extends."

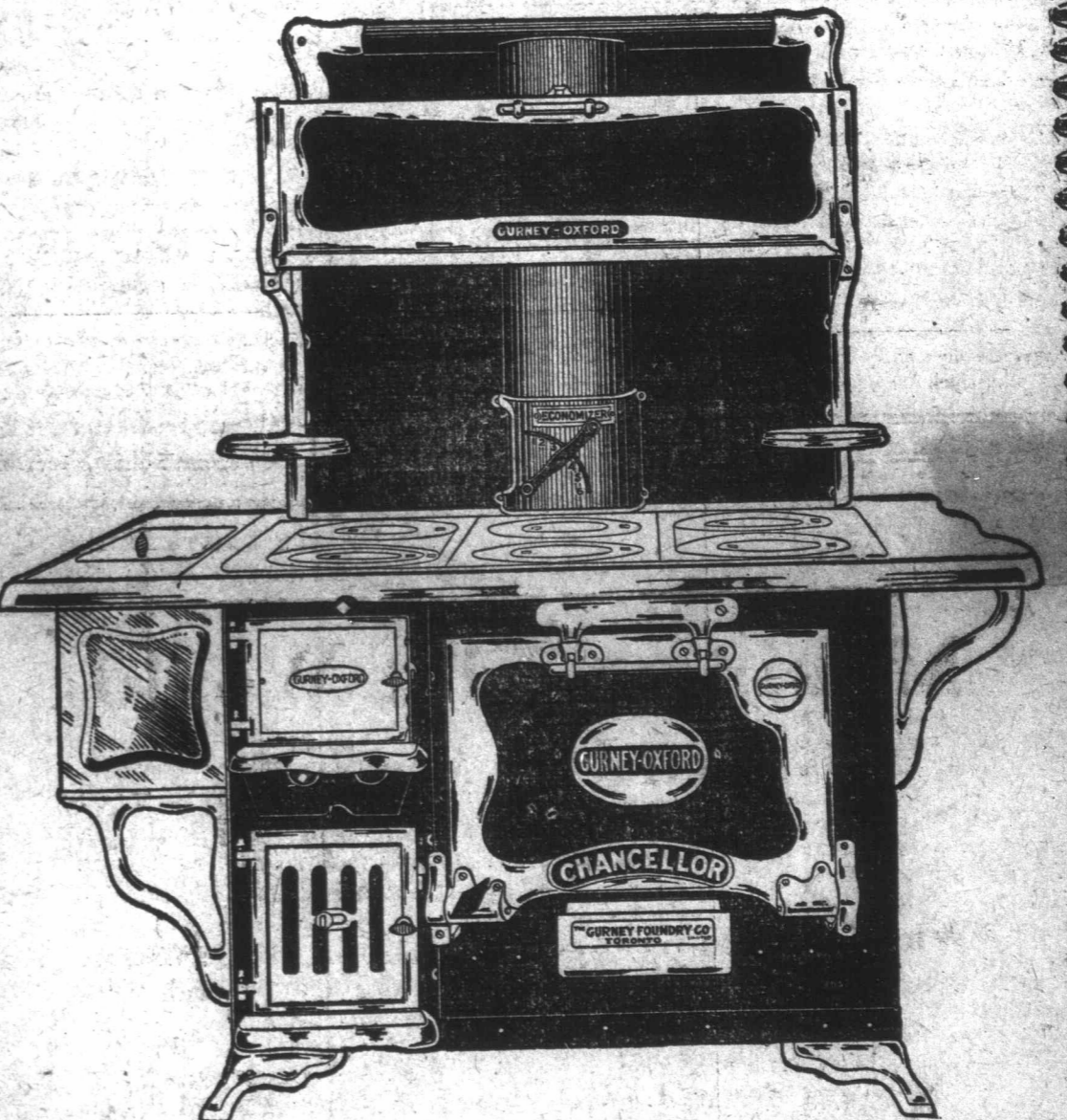
ITALY'S CAPITAL BEING MODERNIZED

HOUSES OF ALL SIZES ARE BEING ERECTED AND THE ANCIENT BEING EFFACED

Rome, Sept. 30—In the course of an interesting account of the growth of Rome in recent years, the British consul says that to any one who has not been in Rome since 1890, the present 1880, the present aspect and general topography of the Italian capital must seem completely changed. The city has gradually expanded beyond its old walls in every direction, and the population has almost doubled since that year. Houses of all sizes from the huge blocks in the poorer districts to the smaller villas of the wealthier classes in the upper part of the city have taken the place of the former fields and orchards, and simultaneously with all this-building activity, most important excavations are being carried out so as to bring to light the remains of the monuments of ancient Rome, a circumstance which tends to corroborate the repeated official statements that in modernizing Rome it is not intended to efface the vestiges of the past. Rents Still Are High As a result of the increased housing accommodation, the demand for rooms is not so persistently pressing as it was a few years ago, but rents are still very high, a fact which is attributable to the present scale of wages demanded by workmen and to the increased cost of building materials, so that a house built now must necessarily cost almost twice as much as it did in former years. In order to counteract these adverse factors certain exemptions from taxation have been accorded to new buildings, but notwithstanding that, the rent of apartments continues to be very high. The municipal authorities, deeply concerned at this state of affairs, resolved six years ago, to levy a tax of 3 per cent per annum and valorem on all vacant building sites within the communal area. It was hoped that as a result of that fiscal burden, landlords would hasten to build over their lands and thus increase house accommodation. Instead of that, however, the landlords momentarily thwarted the operation of the order by filing an application against it in the courts. The latter have recently decided in favor of the municipality and every effort is now being made to collect the tax, which is estimated to yield three million lire an year. Building May Result The revenue under that heading will naturally be a decreasing one, as some of the landlords will no doubt find it more convenient to build, rather than to pay the tax in question. There are evidences here and there of a most healthy tendency to create new industries, and free the Italian capital as much as possible from its costly and inconvenient dependence upon the products of other districts. The process of transformation must necessarily be slow, and is retarded by the unfavorable railway connections between the coast and the city and the present high cost of living. The latter question has attracted a great deal of attention, but none of the measures adopted by the authorities have, to any appreciable extent, helped in reducing the price of commodities.
