## HON. MR. CRERAR OUTLINES PLANS

Meeting in Woodstock Told of  
Platform of United Farmers—  
Says High Tariff has De-  
moralizing Effect

Woodstock, N.B., Dec. 10.—At a big public meeting this evening the platform of the United Farmers of Canada was outlined by Hon. T. A. Crerar, former minister of agriculture and president of the Grain Growers' Association of Canada; G. F. Chipman, editor and managing director of the Grand Growers' Guide of Winnipeg, and T. W. Caldwell, M.P. O. L. Smith, president of the United Farmers' Co-operative Company of New Brunswick Ltd., was chairman and in introducing Mr. Crerar referred to him as probably the next premier of Canada.

Mr. Caldwell made a brief speech in which he thanked the electors of his constituency for the vote they had given him.

Mr. Chipman referred to the growth of the farmers' party movement, saying that the membership now in Alberta, Ontario, and Saskatchewan totaled about 150,000. The farmers' platform, he said, had been outlined by the Canadian Council of Agriculture and had favored public ownership of railways, postal and water navigation and mines.

Other planks in the platform included the abolition of titles, compelling newspapers to publish full facts with regard to their ownership, the abolition of the order-in-council form of government to be replaced by government by the legislature, direct legislation that is giving the people a voice in the government of the country when the legislature does not reflect the voice of the people; no natural resources to be alienated from the crown, but be given on short term leases; the basing of taxation on the prices fixed on lands for sale by land owners. This was in an effort to release vast tracts of land, which the speaker claimed, were held by speculators.

The speaker said that in Manitoba the method of raising campaign funds had been to have each elector in a group of ten give \$1. the proceeds then being brought to the convention by the delegates and sufficient funds had been provided. He looked to see a large delegation of farmers in the next federal house—every rural seat in western Canada, he felt certain would elect a farmer.

Mr. Crerar received a fine reception when he arose to address the meeting. He first stated that the new national policy,

which had been adopted, as the farmers' platform, was not a class policy as claimed by many. A study of the platform would show one of the most important planks in the farmers' policy was the tariff at which they were aiming for reduction in the necessities of life. Protection, Mr. Crerar said, meant the conferring of special privileges on the industries protected. It is claimed by the protectionists, Mr. Crerar said, that the high tariff aimed at the promotion of industries at home, but the net result has been that the manufacturer in Canada, producing under the same conditions as the American manufacturer, can set his prices at the same level as the manufacturer across the line, with the amount of the duty added.

The speaker condemned high tariff as demoralizing and said that our Canadian manufacturers were not so efficient as they would have been if they had had world competition. The protection of the tariff meant the extension of privileges to a few. To replace the revenue which at present accrued from customs duties the farmers advocated increased income tax and the taxing of the unimproved value of lands. In 1918, he said, Canada's income tax had totalled \$20,000,000. New Zealand had raised the same amount with a population of only 1,000,000. He would like to see unity on all sides in Canada.

The chairman at the close of the meeting said the organization had no funds and a collection was taken to defray the expense of the meeting. A vote of thanks was tendered the speakers on motion of Mr. Caldwell.

Clarke of Hartland, all but the last are classed as farmers.

The provisional directors are W. N. Raymond, M. H. Rideout and W. C. Craig.

## SOME WOULD BOND THE TOWN

To Raise Money for Streets, Lights  
and Water Works

The town election will be held the first Tuesday in January. This shall mean the election of six aldermen and a mayor. For the best interest of the town there should be two full tickets, as experience has shown that the greatest amount of satisfaction comes from the popular election of any public body rather than election by acclamation.

The first Town Council was immediately confronted with a number of deep problems which were not easy to solve. One of these problems was the thankless task of trying to please everybody and the Council meets at the end of the year finding themselves very generally criticized with few who praised them.

The Observer has endeavored to get an expression of opinion and a very large number of citizens favor bonding the town for the purpose of furnishing proper streets, lights, sewerage and repairs to the water-works system.

A meeting is called to be held on the evening of Dec. 26 when the Council will be asked what they can promise the people if they seek re-election and a new element will probably be definitely heard from.
