CONDITIONS NORMAL ON WESTERN FRONT

London, Aug. 30.—A report from Field Marshall Sir John French commander in chief of the British army in the field, was given out by the British war office tonight as follows: "Since my last communication of August 18 there has been no fighting on our front to record. There has been a certain amount of mining activity but conditions generally have been normal. Both on the 18th and 21st we succeeded in shooting down enemy aeroplanes. On the 25th our heavy artillery set fire to a railway train at Langemarck stationed about five miles northeast of Ypres. On the same evening our Royal Flying Corps co-operated with our allies in an aerial attack on the forests to the south of Hurst, which was successfully carried out without the loss of any machines.

HE EXECUTES THIRTY-TWO
El Paso, Tex., Aug. 30.—General Francisco Villa and his staff, with a guard of 500 soldiers, arrived in Juarez today from Torreon. He immediately ordered the execution of thirty-two persons for "political reasons." General Villa will return to Torreon this afternoon to prepare for a clash with General Obregon, the Carranzista commander, who is advancing rapidly from the south.

MORE CANADIAN SOLDIERS FOR FRONT

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 30.—Practically all the cabinet ministers are expected to return to Ottawa next week for an important series of meetings of the cabinet council, following the return of Sir Robert Borden. Consideration will be given to different matters with which Sir Robert has been in consultation with British authorities and which would require action at Ottawa.

There is no official confirmation of the report that immediately after the return of Sir Robert Borden to Canada the raising of an additional 50,000 troops in Canada will be authorized. There is no doubt, however, that additional regiments to replace those which will depart shortly for England will be recruited in Canada during the Fall and Winter months.

LET KITCHENER SAY THE WORD

London, Aug. 30.—Lord Cromer, gives his reasons in the times why he deprecates conscription. He says: "In the first place I think that whatever may be my personal opinions my support would at present do more harm than good. In the second it is obvious that the acute difference of opinion which exists on this subject may break up the present coalition, and this, in my opinion, would be disastrous. In the third place, I think this is eminently a question upon which the government, which has full information on the subject should give the lead. When I say the Government I mean more especially Lord Kitchener."

HOUSEHOLD ARTICLES WANTED FOR SHELLS

London, Aug. 30.—The Daily Express appeals to the British government to inaugurate a campaign like that in Germany for the collection of useless household articles of copper, tin and zinc which are needed for the conduct of the war. It declares that more than \$5,000,000 worth of this material is going to waste in attics, store rooms and workshops, which people would willingly part with if they knew the metal would be turned into shells and cartridges.
