### MEADOW BROOK TRAGEDY.

**THE CORONER'S JURY BELIEVE SULLIVAN WAS IMPLICATED IN THE CRIME.**

MONROVIA, Sept. 27.—The coroner's inquest into the Meadow Brook tragedy closed Saturday evening, when the jury found that Eliza and Harris Duttler came to their deaths by foul means, with reasonable grounds to believe, from the evidence submitted, that John E. Sullivan, now under arrest, was implicated in the same.  
The evidence Saturday afternoon was important. Moses Stoves swore that on Friday following the fire he saw Sullivan in the Brunswick hotel bar take from his pocket a roll of bills as large as his wrist and turn over bills.

to hold a one dollar bill with which to pay for the drink. There were three and a half in the roll and witness thought it was his. His opinion is the roll contained between two and three hundred dollars. His attention had been called to Sullivan as the man suspected of being implicated in the fire and he positively identified the prisoner as the man.

John McDonald, who lives alone in the part of the old Moncton hotel, testified that on Thursday night at which the fire occurred, Bruce McDougall, who also had sworn to recognizing Sullivan in Moncton that night, had come to his place and stayed until morning. McDougall had been in the habit of calling on him when on a booze, and this night he was very nervous and he talked with him till morning.

The night clerk of the American house, where McDougall swore he and Sullivan were early Friday morning said the bar had been closed that night before 12 o'clock and had remained closed.  
The verdict of the coroner's jury gives general satisfaction. The inquest lasted nine days, sixty-four witnesses being examined. The only parallel in this part of the province was the famous McCarthy-Osburn case of eighteen years ago.  
The Dutch child rescued from the burning building still lies in a comatose condition and her recovery is extremely doubtful.—Sun.

### Dominion Parliament.

(Continued from last page.)  
Mr. Charlton rejected that such was the talk among congressmen and others at Washington, but about that perhaps Sir Charles did not know.  
The discussion was continued by Messrs. Kloeffer and Henry, the two Ontario conservatives, who made their maiden speeches. Ross Robertson, who while opposing the trade policy of the government thought it not objectionable to allow them a reasonable time in which to bring down their tariff.  
Mr. Henderson of Halifax and Mr. Bell of Prince, the latter of whom referred to the paralysing effect on the industries of Nova Scotia which the uncertain policy of the government would have.  
The house divided on Mr. Foster's amendment, which was defeated by 113 to 70. All patrons and independent voters voted with the government. The result was received with loud liberal cheers and the singing of God Save the Queen.  
In supply Mr. Foster objected to any vote for the interior department until the government announced its reasons for not filling the portfolio.  
Hon. Mr. Laurier replied there were exceptional reasons for delaying the announcement for a few days or perhaps a few weeks longer. There were several precedents set by conservatives for this. The portfolio of railways and canals was vacant for ten months in 1885.  
OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—The whole of the afternoon sitting was taken up discussing the report of the debates committee recommending the dismissal of three French translators for taking part in the last election against the liberal candidates.  
The debate on the French translators was continued after recess, and finally the report to dismiss them was carried.  
The house then went into committee of supply in the interior estimates.  
Premier Laurier briefly outlined the immigration policy of the government. He said there was little probability of immigration from France and Belgium. A recent report from Sir Donald Smith said an increased immigration from the British Isles might be expected, but it was from the overflow of the population from the United States that Canada must expect her greatest increase, and the government would see to it that this emigration was directed our way.  
Sir Charles Tupper congratulated the government on their determination to vigorously deal with this immigration problem.  
At the adjournment Mr. Dobell arose and explained that he was mistaken in informing Sir A. P. Caron the other evening that he had never seen the telegram printed in L'Espresso and alleged to be signed by him, in which the statement was made that the fast line would be all right. On looking over his files Mr. Dobell found that he had sent the telegram in question to a private friend, but never authorized its publication. (Opposition cheers.)  
OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—In the house today Hon. Mr. Fisher introduced a bill under the compulsory branding of cheese.  
Sir Charles Tupper suggested to the premier the advisability of parliament adopting an address congratulating her majesty on having entered upon the sixtieth year of her reign.

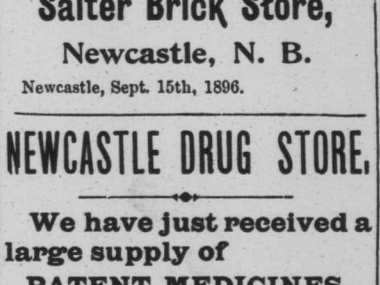
