quit making money when I got what I considered enough.

Early today, after having spent the night roaming about the Latin quarter, Mustapha went home and stabbed to death the sister of Mohamed Ali, the Princess Fatima, and her son, Prince Sulah, while both were asleep.

FELL DEAD IN FIELD. Sudden End of Well-Known Farmer of Southwold Township. St. Thomas, Ont. May 31.—Alex. Cattaneh, one of the most respected citizens of a township of Southwold, died suddenly on his farm, four miles west of Port Stanley, yesterday from heart disease. Mr. Cattaneh, who was apparently in the best of health, was superintending some farm work when he suddenly fell to the ground and passed away. The deceased had always lived in this section of the country, and is survived by his widow and grown-up family.
