Tone of the most idestructive fires that ever took place in any village in this Province occurred at Mount Stewart, on Friday night last, or rather on Saturday morning. The fire was discovered in the store of J. M. Egan, about one o'clock Saturday morning. It had then made considerable headway. How it originated is not known. The kerosene oil, turpentine and other inflammable articles in the stores fed the devouring filames, and in a very short time the village was ablaze, the flames shooting high into the air, and casting a lurid light over the scene, while the powder and other combustible material caused many loud intonations. All the stores, residences and buildings, on the south side of Main Street, from Ross's to the river, and on the north side from McRachern's to the river, were destroyed.
