## League Football

Collegians Defeat Stars by Two Goals to Nil.

The football match between the Collegians and Stars last evening on St. George's Field brought the record audience of the season to witness it, the grand stand and margin of the arena being crowded with enthusiastic spectators who cheered on their respective teams as either made a point in the progress of the game. A stiff westerly wind blew, but the weather was nice and warm and the game was thoroughly enjoyed. Having won the toss the Stars played the western goal with the sun and wind in their backs. The teams lined up: Stars.—Goal, W. Clare; backs, J. Hart, L. Kavanagh; halves, W. Duggan, S. Sullivan; T. Jackman; forwards, E. Power, J. Morgan, E. Brien, M. McEvoy and J. Adams.

Collegians.—Goal, H. Butler; backs, Ayre, Thomas; halves, Pike, E. Barnes, Sparks; forwards, H. Barnes, Noonan, Aitken, Quick and Fenwick. The Collegians began play with a rush up field which the Stars backs easily repelled, after which Duggan fouled and a well placed shot was deftly saved by Clare in goal. Brien from the right wing had a shot but the ball went wide, the Stars then worked west and Fenwick shot but Clare again prevented scoring. Brien then shot for the Collegian goal but the ball soared over the goal posts; the Collegians retaliated by working the ball west but the Stars backs did the needful. Securing a corner Brien, of the Stars, placed the ball well and it was right in the Collegians goal when Butler deftly handled it out amidst loud applause. Jackman, of the Stars, right centre, then shot but skied the sphere and it went out over the twines, and afterwards the Stars secured corners which were placed well, but Butler, in goal, could not be beaten. The Collegians then rushed up field but the ball was sent back to midfield when Jackman, of the Stars, passed to Brien who sent in a beauty but as usual so high that it went over the goal. The ball was now constantly in Collegian territory, several corners were secured, McEvoy and others shot for goal; one or two fouls were recorded against both teams after which the referee's whistle blew half time and the teams crossed without scoring.

### HALF TIME.

After a breathing spell the sphere was once more put in play, and it could be seen that the Collegians were intended to put up a hard fight or victory. They rushed the Stars goal but the backs were impregnable, and taking the ball out of danger got it up against the wind. Morgan shot but went wide of the mark. Getting down with the wind the Collegians now gave a good exhibition, their playing being fast and marked by good combination and skill in passing. Barnes had a try and skied the leather over the goal posts but secured a corner which, however, was without result; Ayre shot a beauty from midfield but it went wide, and the Collegians were bombarding their opponents' goal. Barnes shot a beauty from midfield but Clare saved, when Quick narrowly missed doing the trick for the Collegians by a nice shot from the left wing, the ball striking and rebounding from the goal post. Aitken now got control of the ball and passed from the right wing to Quick whose name is no misnomer. He changed it between the posts, scoring the first goal for the Collegians. Both sides had rebounded their efforts, the Stars to equalize and the Collegians to increase their lead, and at last play all over the field was witnessed. Corners were conceded the Collegians and fouls against the Stars when Quick again placed the ball between the twines from a corner kick but it was not touched by the Stars and was of no value. **LONDON, June 9.**  
Lloyd George finance is the reason given by some officials for the Birbeck Bank's suspension, a statement that will cause greatest consternation when it becomes commercially known to 112,000 depositors. The directors of the Bank promise the immediate payment of ten shillings in the pound, and expect eventually to pay eighteen shillings, but in the greatest depreciated condition, the largest amount of securities held by the Bank will take a long time to realize.

**MEXICO CITY, June 9.**  
Reports filtering into the city from various sources say that more than a thousand persons were killed, and twice that number were injured, whilst scores of villages have been destroyed as the result of Wednesday's earthquake.

**LONDON, June 9.**  
Queen Mary has decided that the Gift of the Marys, which aggregated \$60,000, shall be used for the purchase of her insignia of the order of the Garter in diamonds, and for portraits of King Edward and the Prince of Wales.

**LONDON, June 9.**  
The Coronation ceremony was rehearsed to-day in the Abbey Church of St. Peter at Westminster; many of the principal participants being coached in the roles that they will fill on June 22nd.

**ROME, June 9.**  
Signor Marra, the aviator, was instantly killed to-day, as the result of a fall from his aeroplane.
