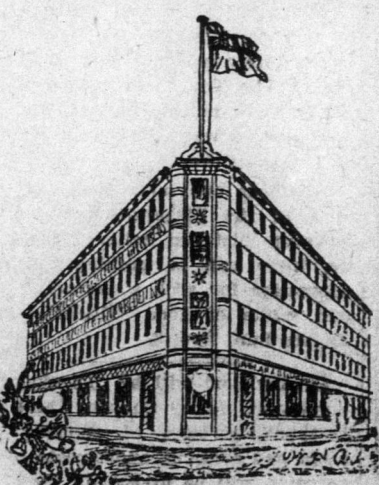

Special Evening Telegram.
 WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Nov. 27
 The Minister of Customs has announced that a tariff will be introduced next session of Parliament, taxing foreign goods in favour of those of British origin.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.
 Andrew Carnegie, in a statement, has announced that all but \$25,000,000 of his fortune, which amount will be disposed of by will, will be left to the Carnegie Corporation, New York, which has been made his residuary legatee, and which will carry on his educational and charitable work.

LONDON, Nov. 27.
 The Duke and Duchess of Manchester expect to have the honour of entertaining King George and Queen Mary in Ireland early next spring. The Duke says County Armagh will give their Majesties a royal welcome. The King will visit the Duke of Devonshire at Blenheim Castle, whilst Waterford, Dublin and other ports will be visited by him in the royal yacht.

PARIS, Nov. 27.
 "Our friendship with England is one of the main guarantees of European peace," said Joseph Reinart, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, to-night at the Thanksgiving dinner of the American Club of Paris. The Deputy continued that the friendship is, nevertheless, young compared with that between the United States and France, and not a single cloud ever passed over it. "Our soldiers crossed to fight for freedom, and your ideas crossed back to help us to our liberty."

LONDON, Nov. 27.
 The fact that the Powers have at last realized that they are drifting to certain conflict, tends to relieve the immediate tension, into which the international tangle has developed. The belief that Britain, France and Germany will succeed in averting the threatened general European war has been strengthened within the past twenty-four hours and it is now asserted that Austro-Hungary is prepared to agree to questions concerning the future of Albania and the desire of Serbia for an Adriatic port, being settled in connection with all other issues, arising from the Balkan war, as recently proposed by Premier

Asquith. Should this be confirmed, the existing dangerous pressure would be removed. Diplomats say that they see plenty of methods for meeting the requirements of Serbia, without seriously inconveniencing Austro-Hungary or burying the formula of Albania for the Albanians. Even the occupation of the port of Durazzo by Serbian troops will not necessarily change the international situation, as it is a long step from present occupation to permanent retention of the port of Serbia, a question that can only be settled by agreement of the Powers.
