1838.—This spring was a cold one, ce packed in on the land up to a late date. A number of vessels be-lenging to St. John's were ice bound at White Bay. The Association of Inderwriters, sent a vessel to their assistance; she was also laden with clothing and provisions for the seal-

ers on those vessels 1839 .- A vessel from Greenspond made three trips this spring, bringing all told, 10,000 seals. The women of King's Cove hauled tows of whitecoats as well as the men; 17,000 seals were hauled by the King's Cove

1841.—Seals were numerous around he coast; the Methodist Minister at seals on March the 1st, not bad for a

lergyman. 1842 .- This spring was famous for sealers' strike. 1845.—Another strike took place;
