SCALDED TO DEATH.

KINGSTON, Ont., June 19. Two men were scalded to death and two others were seriously burned to-day when the mud port on the steam-er Atikoka blew up.

STRIKE ORDER OBEYED.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C., June 19. The strike order yesterday was generally obeyed by unions affiliated with Trades and Labor Councils. The city is pretty well tied up. Retail clerks, milk and bread drivers, postal workers and typists are exempted.

SMELTERS CLOSED.

GRAND FORKS, D.C., June 19. Because of a lack of coke, through strike at the Crow's Nest Pass, the coal mines of the Granby Company will close their smelters there and at Phoenix.

TORONTO STRIKE FOR MONDAY.

TORONTO, June 19. Nothing can prevent a strike of the street railway men here next Monday as the leaders refuse the offer of the Board of Conciliation and demand fifty-five cents per hour and an eight hour day.

IN FAVOR OF SIGNING.

BERLIN, June 19. The Berliner Tageblatt says that Zarzebeberger, Noske, Wisel, Schmidt and Bauer of the German cabinet are in favor of signing the peace treaty while ninety per cent of the Socialist majority, thirty per cent of the Democrats and the entire Independent faction are ready to yield.

FURTHER EXTENSION PROBABLE.

LONDON, June 19. If the German National Assembly orders a plebiscite on the Peace Treaty Saturday, the voting will have to be done, so that the German answer can reach the Allies in Paris by 6.49 p.m. Monday, Paris time, unless the Germans should request, and the Allies grant, a further extension of time in which to answer the amended Peace Treaty.

JINGO WINS ASCOT.

LONDON, June 19. The Ascot gold cup was won to-day by Jingo at 5 to 1. Air Raid at 5 to 1 was second, and Roamer at 20 to 1, was third. Four ran.

ITALIAN GOVT. DEFEATED.

ROME, June 19. The Govt., headed by Vittorio E. Orlando, Prime Minister, was defeated in the Chamber of Deputies to-day, in a vote of confidence, and when the chamber adjourned this evening, it was expected that Signor Orlando would shortly announce the resignation of the cabinet.

POLICE CLASH WITH STRIKERS. WATERBURY, Conn., June 19. Encounters between police and strikers to-night resulted in the injury of twelve policemen, three seriously.

MARTIAL LAW IN HAMBURG. COPENHAGEN, June 19. Martial law has been proclaimed in the Hamburg harbor zone, because of raids on food depots.

DUE TO STENCH BOMB.

CHICAGO, June 19. The throat operation which Lord Northcliffe underwent yesterday is believed to have been due to stench from a bomb hurled at a banquet here, two years ago.

BOLEHEVIST PROPAGANDA.

NEW YORK, June 19. Pamphlets, written by Lenin and Trotsky, making direct appeals to American workers to rise and take things in their own hands, which were seized at the Russian Soviet Bureau here, formed part of the evidence at a hearing to-day of the Lusk committee
