#### Government Regulations in the regulating of prices.

(Trade Review.)

The decision of the Supreme Court on Thursday last has upset all the new regulations inaugurated by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries Department to control the price of our fish in Foreign Markets.

It was an innovation that very few agreed with, but we were all so anxious to see something done to shake up the dry bones in that Department that we are willing to undergo many inconveniences in the hope that some

First we want a thorough inspec tion and a system of instruction to get our fishermen into uniform methods of work.

We have pointed out these methods of procedure so often that it is needless to repeat them. The Department must start from the very catching of the fish and see it cured properly. When this is done there will be no fear of our Merchants and Exporters selling it too cheap, but we ver tion that we will not be able to pro duce half enough fish to supply the increasing demand for all we can

It is absurd for us to take our cusmers by the throat and say they ust do this or that. It is our busiwith us. We must serve them well be-

fore we can expect to have any word on the sale of our fish before it leaves

If the Government intend to continue these Regulations, we ask them to decide one question: Whether they

in Newfoundland when shippers are intend to favor the consigning of fish allowed to ship their fish on consignfor sale to foreign markets, or insist ment to foreign markets.
