The Evangelists

At Gower Street Church.

Most of the workers and those interested in the success of the meeting predicted a small attendance because of the rain storm, and terrible condition of the streets; but their reckoning was all wrong, for not less than nine hundred people were present last night. There was the usual singing of inspiring hymns, and prayer by Rev. T. B. Darby, M.A., after which Mrs. Demarest and her Secretary, Miss Bergeson, sang a duet, the latter taking the alto. Their voices blended beautifully, and one verse in the French language was a novelty.

Mrs. Demarest took as her subject last night, "The Message of Christ's Resurrection to Every Man," reading as her text, Matthew 27:57; 28:1-15. She said in part:

Our Lord Jesus Christ took the sinner's place on the cross of Calvary, for it is written, "Accursed is every man that hangeth upon the tree." He was made sin for us. He who knew no sin, that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him. He suffered the consequences of our sin, which are pain and death. For our sakes He even suffered the intolerable agony of momentary separation from God, as witnessed by His cry of anguish, "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken me?" Who can deny the reality of sin, or underestimate its frightful power in face of the fact that even for a moment it came between the Father and the Son, when the Son had been the creation of the Father before the creation of the world? It could do that, are you surprised that it can separate you from God forever? Christ overcame sin and death on the Resurrection morning, and because He overcame we can also overcome. He imparts His resurrection power and His life to those who believe on Him. "Whoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die." Christ did not only take the sinner's place on the cross, but also in the grave. He suffered the full penalty, for the man that sinneth he shall surely die. Every sinner is dead—dead in the trespasses and sins. Death means the end of all hope humanly speaking. Nothing can be done for a dead body. Death brings

Statement From the Food Board.

The attached statement is published by request of the Board:

The Food Control Board recognise that the public have a perfect right to know what is being done by the Board. From the appointment of the Board meetings have been held once or twice each week, and matters relating to the supply, and prices, of various necessities of life have been fully discussed.

FLOUR.
The first matter to engage the attention of the Board was the completion of the arrangements, begun by the Prime Minister, under which the surcharge of two dollars, which had been placed by the Canadian Wheat Board on every barrel of flour exported from Canada, was to be rescinded in our case. Mr. T. A. Hall had been to Ottawa and negotiated successfully towards this end. The details of the arrangement, however, took some days. Among these is the control of imports by the Food Board, who work with the Canadian Wheat Board, Ball transactions having to be jointly authorized. Pre-war flour, that is, what we know as white flour, can be obtained, though it may be pointed out that Canada is not using such a high grade flour.

SUGAR.
The Board have gone fully into the matter of sugar, and are keeping in closest touch with almost every transaction in that commodity. Supplies for these two months have not been very heavy, but the fact that there have been very few opportunities to ship to the outports has made the position easier. The Board have been considering the prices, and find that there have been some shipments which had come in at high prices which accounts for the fact that last week sugar sold in some stores for 25 cents a pound.

The retail price of sugar in most of the stores of Water Street and Duckworth Street to-day is 22 cents, and in some it is even less. This does not represent an unjust profit. The public can be assured that prices are being watched, and they are asked not to be persuaded of a coming shortage, and so become panicky, and lay in large stocks of sugar. Let everyone confine himself to present needs, which will then give no excuse to a retailer to protect his prices by suddenly raising his prices. As far as the Board's information goes there is every indication that next month will see sugar lower in price, and full supplies are assured unless transportation difficulties arise.

BREAD.
The Board were occupied all one session in taking evidence relative to the recent increase of bread. Various makers of bread appeared and were examined upon oath, as to the ingredients, their cost, and the profit made, and figures were given in justification of the increase. The Board are of the opinion that the law which was passed in 1916 relating to the standardization of loaves of bread, under which they are to be of one, two, three or four pound respectively, and the weight is to be shown in plain figures on each loaf, should be put in force again.

MILK, etc.
The milk increase, and other matters, are to be taken up this week.

In these tongues these words. Elol Elol Lanna Sabachthani, being interpreted, My God my God why hast Thou forsaken me. This was at the end of the human man that was Conceived of the Virgin Mary on this Earth. His Name was Jesus. The precious Holy Ghost led him to the cross of Calvary. It was there he suffered that awful death not accepting deliverance. This same Jesus said: If ye love me you will keep my commandments. And this is His Commandment: That ye Love one another as I have loved you. If ye bite and devour one another ye shall be consumed one of another. Let me lead you to St. Mark's Gospel, 3 chapter, 29 verse: But he that shall blaspheme against the Holy Ghost hath everlasting punishment. Because they said he had an unclean spirit. Do you know that these are the words of God, and every time you speak against Bible evidence you not only stand in danger of yourself, but you put the precious "saviour" to an open shame. We find in St. Mark's Gospel, 16 chapter, 15 and 16 verses: The precious Commission to His Disciples, after He rose from the dead. Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature; he that believeth the gospel and is baptized shall be saved but he that believeth not shall be damned, any man that believeth these scriptures will keep them. As being called and baptised with the Holy Ghost and fire to preach the gospel of the Kingdom I can't suffer to see the precious robes of my loving Saviour dragged down to the view of the old carnal man which is enmity against God.
