The new bridge now in course of construction over the Frith of Tay, in Scotland, will be the longest bridge in the world—longer even than the Victoria bridge, Montreal. The Victoria bridge is 9,194 feet long, while the Tay bridge will be 10,321, making a difference in favor of Tay bridge of 1,126 feet. If the Tay bridge is eighty yards longer, it would be two miles exactly, and for all intents and purposes it may therefore be called a two-mile bridge, and will have ninety piers and eighty-nine spans.

The number of vessels arriving at Duluth up to the 1st inst. has been as follows:—From American ports, 286; from Canadian ports, 68; total, 354. The number of men carried by these vessels was 6,565.—For the week ending on the 5th inst. the amount of wheat received at Duluth was 89,569 bushels. The total amount received for this season is 174,078 bushels.
