Church and Race Relation Talk

(By The Associated Negro Press)

Estes Park, Col., July-Speaking here recently before the Association of Student Secretaries of the Y.M.C.A. Dr. George E. Haynes, Secretary Commission on the Church and Race Relations of the Federal Council of Churches, said: "There have been three periods of relations between white people and Colored people of America: the period of exploitation, when white people worked Negroes (the period of slavery and the years immediately following); the period of benefaction, when white people worked for Colored people as objects of philanthropy. We are now entering upon the third stage of inter-racial co-operation when white people are working with Colored, for the advancement of their common interests.

WHITE WOMEN ANXIOUS FOR PROTECTION OF COLORED WOMEN

(By the Associated Negro Press)

New York, July-The white women of the south are awakening to the fact that all women are akin whatever their color, according to an article in "The World's Work" on the Southern Inter-racial Committee, in which he quotes a woman member who says:

"The most significant aspect of the better protection of black women rests in the fact that this has been the point on which the white women of the South, who have been working with us, have spoken most boldly. For the first time in the history of the South white women are beginning to understand the indignities to which colored women are constantly subjected, and these white women have expressed themselves again and again as determined to secure protection of all womanhood, regardless of color. In raising the status of colored women the white woman preserves her own.

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
