Church and Race Relation Talk

Estes Park, Col., July—Speaking here recently before the Association of Student Secretaries of the Y.M.C.A. Dr. George E. Haynes, Secretary Commission on the Church and Race Relations of the Federal Council of Churches, said: "There have been three periods of relations between white people and Colored people of America: the period of exploitation, when white people worked Negroes (the period of slavery and the years immediately following); the period of benefaction, when white people worked for Colored people as objects of philanthropy. We are now entering upon the third stage of inter-racial co-operation when white people are working with Colored, for the advancement of their common interests. "It is imperative for the future of America that the evils that have come out of the period of exploitation such as an unequal division of tax funds for public schools, mob murder through lynching, wages lower than those paid to other workers, should no longer be tolerated. The Negro people have made creditable contributions to American literature, science and music, as well as given indispensable values to agriculture and industry by their labor. America cannot afford to lose these contributions in the future by denying Negroes full opportunity of achievement. "Negroes are now moving into northern industrial centers at the rate of over 34,000 per year. They are leaving places where they felt insecure in their person and property and where economic inducements are below modern standards. They are seeking to better their condition. Their white neighbors, North and South, have vital interests involved and cannot afford to be inactive.

Trying To Stop Colored Exodus

Atlanta, Ga., July—The Exodus will be stopped if a sensible remedy can be found by the City Club. This was announced by Joel B. Hunter, Chairman of a special committee of the club which had the matter under discussion last week. "We realize," said Mr. Hunter, "that the question involves both a temporary and a permanent aspect, which makes the task much more difficult. There are certain remedies which might retard the movement over which no committee nor organization has the slightest control and it is altogether problematical whether such remedies would prove effective." Leading Negroes appear willing to help the City Club solve the vexing question.

WHITE WOMEN ANXIOUS FOR PROTECTION OF COLORED WOMEN

New York, July—The white women of the south are awakening to the fact that all women are akin whatever their color, according to an article in "The World's Work" on the Southern Inter-racial Committee, in which he quotes a woman member who says:

"The most significant aspect of the better protection of black women rests in the fact that this has been the point on which the white women of the South, who have been working with us, have spoken most boldly. For the first time in the history of the South white women are beginning to understand the indignities to which colored women are constantly subjected, and these white women have expressed themselves again and again as determined to secure protection of all womanhood, regardless of color. In raising the status of colored women the white woman preserves her own.
