Goldard, the Australian pugilist, on Monday defeated Joe Chynski, of California, in four rounds for a purse of \$10,000 and the championship of Australia.

Goldard had the advantage throughout.

James McCormick, of Crystal Falls, Mich., died Saturday from injuries received in a prize fight with Wm. Daniels, of Rhineclaire.

The fight was ten rounds with light gloves. In the seventh round McCormick appeared dazed and fell unconscious under a terrific blow from Daniels. Daniels and his seconds, Frank Brouillette and John Dale, have been arrested on a charge of murder.

In a series of athletic sports held at Paddington on Saturday E. D. Lange, one of the visiting team of the Manhattan Athletic Club, of New York, easily won the eight-mile walk. H. Curtis, the English champion, finished third.
