REMINISCENCES REVIVED WHICH VITALLY AFFECT THE PRESENT CITY ELECTION-NO WASHBILL INQUIRIES OR DELAYS IN THE REGISTRATION NOW IN PROG-

The Free Press has strongly opposed the perfecting of the voters' lists by registration. It argues that it would be a very proper thing to deprive hundreds of young men voters of their right to go to the polls. It mattered not to Mr. Hobbs' opponents if these voters were robbed of their cherished rights. In the opinion of the newspaper advocate of Mr. Essery the old voters' list is good enough, and all the new voters should go without votes. Our contemporary has even taken the view of a legal adviser-we wonder who he iswho asserted that there are grave doubts as to whether the city has a right to the benefits of registration under the act of the Legislature! There are no doubts on the subject in the mind of anyone who carefully read the act or who followed the discussion which preceded its adoption.

Let us call the attention of the electors to the fact that the opponents of Mr. Hobbs through their newspaper exponent have taken the stand that registration on the eve of an election is wrong-that it is better to have an election on an incomplete list give to every man 21 year of age ample opportunity to have his name put on the lists without trouble or expense to him. This opposition to registration has rightly been interpreted as fearfulness that the young men of the city are determined to support Mr. Hobbs in the present contest, and therefore, it is argued, they should have been disfranchised. We recommend the young men to remember this fact on election day.

But the Free Press says that there should have been no registration because of the expense. On the same plea, there should be no voters' list at all, because its compilation costs money, and there should be polling booths on election day, because they have to be paid for It is true that the registration will cost some money. But will our contemporary tell us how the work could be done more cheaply? The law only makes it imperative that four registration places shall be provided; but the registrars, in their wisdom, resolved that there should be one for each of the six wards. Surely no reasonable man will oppose the change if it makes the work of a complete registration less difficult of accomplishment. The city pays the cost of registration. Why not? Londoners are self-respecting. They never object to pay for services that are purely for the benefit of the whole people of the

-A novel industry has been started in the San Joaquin Valley, California, by Chicago tanners, who will cultivate a weed from whose roots they can tan better leather than from anything else. The weed is canaigre, of the yellowdock family. This vegetable contains 23 to 33 per cent of tannic acid, which can be extracted by chemical process at small expense and large profits to the producer. Two hundred carloads of twelve tons each have been ordered from the mountains of New Mexico, where it abounds. The producers expect to get about 500 carloads of the concentrated canaigre acid a year, amounting to something like 6,000 tons. This will be shipped to Chicago for tanneries near the stock yards. In addition to growing the plant, there will be extensive works for reducing the roots into pulp, composed mostly of tannic acid. The growth of this weed may revolutionize the leather industry of the continent. Can it be cultivated in British Columbia ?




