NORTHWEST FREIGHT RATES.
Mr. Van Horne Says They Are None Too High.

WINNIPEG, May 3.—Mr. Van Horne and party arrived yesterday morning. In an interview relating to the rate the president of the Canadian Pacific Railway said that reductions could not be made simply because somebody thought they ought to be. If the directors thought the rates too high or anyway unfair they would already have been changed. The present rates, therefore, represent the views of the directors on the subject, in which he fully concurred. Speaking of the recent charges, he said it was not the intention of the company to remove the car shops from Winnipeg. The reduction of the staff was simply a temporary measure forced upon the company by the depressed state of trade and the unsatisfactory outcome of business during the past season. Respecting his prophecy about \$2 a bushel for wheat, he said the report misrepresented his meaning. No new works would be undertaken this year, and the double track from Winnipeg to Fort William is not expected to be necessary within five years.

SKYLARKING WITH SCALPELS.

One University Student Cuts Another Severely in a Frolic.

PROVIDENCE, May 3.—Walter L. Crosby, a student at Brown University, cut Dallas L. Sharpe with a scalpel covered with the blood of a dog, and the injured man is in the hospital. Sharpe lives in New Jersey, and is a very popular student at the college. Crosby is a heavy-weight boxer, and he is known in the university as a fine athlete. The two students were in an upper room of Rhode Island Hall this morning, where instruction in comparative physiology is given. Each had scalpels in hand and were cutting up the body of a dog. They began to joke about the dog, and the play developed into a frolic, the two making lunges at each other. Crosby became somewhat excited, and in making a lunge at Sharpe hit him in the abdomen. The wound was quite deep, and it is considered particularly dangerous because the dog's blood was on the point of the scalpel.

The affair was kept quiet, and Sharpe was placed in a secluded part of the building. Later a physician in the neighborhood of the college was called, and he was followed in the afternoon by Dr. Frank L. Day, who thought Sharpe ought to be transferred to the hospital at once. The removal was delayed until tonight, when the ambulance went around to the college, and the sufferer was removed. It is feared that Sharpe may die from blood poisoning.

SARNIA SUNBEAMS.
The Town Growing—Lacrosse Booming—Liberal Convention.

Sarnia is going to have a strong lacrosse team this season. The club met on Wednesday evening and elected the following officers: Honorary president, W. B. J. Williams; president, J. C. Mahony; vice-president, E. T. Bates; secretary-treasurer, A. Kalsen; captain, W. H. Hobb; executive committee, J. Winstanley, G. Higginbotham, and J. B. Livingston. The club expects to bring the membership up over 100 this year.

Andrew Murray, of Sarnia township, is the latest addition to our city police force. The hotel keepers and retail liquor dealers of Lambton are organizing to fight prohibition at the coming election.

Sells Bros. circus will exhibit at Port Huron on Friday, May 25.

The annual tea meeting in the Baptist Brook Street Mission Chapel, will take place on Monday evening, May 7. Addresses will be delivered by the ministers of the town, and selections of vocal and instrumental music will be given. Proceeds in aid of the building fund.

Next Monday the steamer Idlewild will be put on the route between here and Detroit as the morning boat.

Port Huron capitalists are contemplating building an electric railway between their city and Lexington, along the lake shore, a distance of eighteen miles.

The Liberals of Sarnia are moving in rapid succession to a convention at an early date to nominate a candidate for the Local Legislature.

Our town council have passed a bylaw to close up parts of Rose, Shamrock and Tecumseh streets in ward 4 and convey the land to the St. Clair Tunnel Company, in exchange for land with which to open up a new street to be called Dufferin avenue.

Mr. Campbell, of our College Institute, has been appointed to the position of examiner in the university department examinations, which are to be held at London, Hamilton and Toronto.

The contracts for Mr. Peterson's new hotel have been let, and work will be commenced at once. It will cost \$10,000.

Mr. Tancock, of Huron College, London conducted services in St. George's Church Sarnia on Sunday last, in the absence of Rev. T. R. Davis, rector.

The assessor has returned his rolls and gives the following valuable statistics: Total assessment for 1894, \$2,045,840, an increase of \$34,151 over 1893. Our population shows an increase of 205.

Dr. Dixon, of Toronto, who removed to Ontario's domain and was going to locate at Alpena, Mich., took out in his household effects \$300 worth of lace curtains, but they were seized by the customs officials over there and the doctor had to pay the duty.

Lost in the Ice.
HALIFAX, N. S., May 3.—A St. Paul's Island report to-day says: "The bar Liberte, of Madrid, Norway, 30 days out, bound for Shediac, N. B., had boarded hands from the steamer Valette, of West Hartlepool, from Cardiff, for St. John's, Nfld., which steamer foundered on April 18 among the fields of ice 50 miles east of St. John's. The crew was picked up six hours afterwards."

Brokers Before the Bar.
NEW YORK, May 3.—Messrs. Edward Lamontagne, jun., E. M. Fulton, jun., and Herman Clarke, former members of the brokerage firm of Lamontagne, Clarke & Co., who are charged by Florence H. David, of Montreal, a former customer, with the embezzlement of \$75,000, were arraigned this morning before Justice Taintor in the Tombs police court. At the request of Lawyer Goff the case was adjourned until May 12. No testimony was heard to-day.

HIGH AND DRY.

The Gold Outgo.
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 3.—Assistant Secretary Curtis said this morning that his advices from New York indicated that the export movement of gold may reach \$4,000,000 or \$5,000,000 this week, and if the high rates of sterling exchange that now obtains continue to prevail the export of gold for May may reach \$15,000,000. Last week the treasury lost \$16,000,000 in gold. He expected, he said, most of the gold exported this month to be withdrawn from the treasury.
