In the wings of the gallery and on the floor of the house were assembled a number of the friends of the university, who also manifested the keenest interest throughout. On the platform were the following gentlemen: Provost Watkins, Dr. Moorhouse, dean of the medical faculty, Canon Smith, Prof. Harrison, Rev. Canon Dann, Drs. Bucke, Ferguson, Eccles, Williams, Wishart, Gardiner, Hodge, J. B. Campbell, Meek and Waugh. As the faculty made their way to the platform they were greeted by the
