GALVESTON'S

AWFUL LOSS!

Death and Destruction on Every Hand!

Extent of the Calamity Can Only Now Be Estimated.

Its Full Measure May Never Be Known.

Late Details of the Catastrophe—Every Ocean Steamer in the Harbor Is Stranded and All the Wharves De- stroyed—From 600 to 1,000 People Killed.

Galveston, Texas, Sept. 10.—Six hun- dred to 1,000 persons killed; a city al- most in ruins; the wharf front entire- ly gone; every ocean steamer strand- ed; death and destruction on every hand, and a money loss that cannot yet be estimated, are the results of the appalling calamity that has befallen Galveston. The great storm has left her helpless, and her stricken people are compelled to appeal to the outside world for aid.
 An accurate count of the dead is im- possible, and the real number killed in the storm will probably
 NEVER BE KNOWN.
 No one attempts to estimate the damage to business and residence prop- erty.
 The fine steamer Alamo lies upon the top of the Mallory wharf, and a big cotton-laden English steamer was driven ashore at Texas City. Other vessels are aground in different parts of the bay, some hopelessly wrecked.
 IMMEDIATE RELIEF NEEDED.
 The people of Galveston need im- mediate relief. A stricken city is in misfortune, and the people of the country are asked to send food, cloth- ing and water. The waterworks are in ruins; the cisterns all blown away or filled with salt water. Ruin is everywhere. Electric light and tele- graph poles are nearly all prostrated, and the streets are littered with tim- bers, slate, glass and every conceivable character of debris.
 SCARCELY A HOME ESCAPED DAMAGE.
 There is hardly a habitable house in the city, and nearly every business home is badly damaged.
 The school buildings were unroofed, and badly wrecked. Fine churches are in ruins. Elevators and warehouses are unfit for use, and the electric light plant and the cotton factory have col- lapsed. From Tremont to P. street, and thence to the beach not the vestige of a residence is to be seen.
 TEN FEET UNDER WATER.
 In the business section of the city the water was from three to ten feet deep in stores. Stocks of all kinds in- cluding foodstuffs are total losses.
 While the Post correspondent was in Galveston Saturday night, it was a common sight for him to see women and children emerging from their homes dazed and bleeding from wounds, the women sometimes wad- ding neck deep with babies in their arms.
 CUT OFF.
 The city is cut off entirely from the world, so far as wire communication is concerned. In sailing to Texas City yesterday the Post correspondent used a strong glass but could see nothing of any of the bridges which had con- nected the island with the mainland. Where one bridge should have been a big ocean vessel lay stranded.
 At Texas City the wharves were de- stroyed. The water front for a mile was littered with ruins. Much of the debris had been blown from Galveston. At Texas City three lives were lost.
 The storm commenced raging be- tween 9 and 10 o'clock Saturday morn- ing, and by noon the waters from the gulf had inundated the island as far inland as Twelfth street here in Galveston. From there the waters gradually encroached farther inland, rising about 15 inches an hour. At 6 p.m. the water was 56 inches of water in the lobby of the Tremont Hotel, the highest point in the city. At 9 o'clock the water on Market street was
 LEVEL WITH THE SEATS OF THE STREET CARS.
 After the water gradually receded, the wind was cyclonic in its force. It reached a velocity of 84 miles an hour, and then the instruments in the govern- ment observatory were wrecked.
 As soon as daylight came, and the fury of the wind had abated, the work of rescue and searching for the dead commenced. In one room the reporter counted seven dead bodies. The Tremont Hotel was made a rendezvous for the living.
 1,500 PERSONS DROWNED.
 Dallas, Texas, Sept. 10.—A special to the News from Houston says: Addi- tional particulars of the storm at Gal- veston show that about 1,500 persons were drowned and \$10,000,000 worth of property destroyed. There is not a building in the city that was not dam- aged to some extent. All the bath- houses on the beach were destroyed, and their attendants drowned.
 PATIENTS IN HOSPITALS PERISH.
 The Sealy Hospital was destroyed, and most of the patients drowned.
 The grain elevators were destroyed.

THE WORK OF RESCUE.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 10.—The work of rescuing the wounded and dying from the ruins of their homes un- covered some terrible scenes. Streets filled with floating rubbish mingled with the bodies of victims of the storm, were among the sights. When the rescuers reached the city hall there were congregated fully 700 people, most of whom were more or less injured. One man reported the loss of 60 lives in the building from which he had es- caped. He himself was severely in- jured.

TERRIBLE DISCOVERIES.

On Avenue P, by climbing over the piles of lumber which had once been residences, the rescuing party observ- ed four bodies in one yard and seven in one room in another place, while 60 bodies were counted in the space of one block. A majority of the bodies, however, are under the ruined houses, and it will take several days' hard work to get all of them out.

ONLY EIGHT ESCAPED FROM A HOSPITAL.

The report from St. Mary's Infirmary shows that only eight persons escaped from the hospital. The number of patients and nurses could not be as- certained, but the number of inmates was seldom under 100. The beach re- sort of Pat O'Keefe, known to every visitor to Galveston, was annihilated, and a large building remained. Mrs. O'Keefe was drowned. The great bathing pavilion known as "The Pa- goda," the big pleasure resort known as "The Olympia," and Murdoch's bath houses were all swept away into the gulf. There were few bodies on the beach. They had been swept into the gulf or driven up into the rubbish by the waves. Only half a dozen of them were in sight from where the workers were.

EVERY HOUSE A MORGUE.

All the residences which escaped de- struction and the leading hotels have been turned into hospitals. There is scarcely a house left standing which does not contain one or more of the dead and many injured.
 Galveston, Sept. 10.—Fifteen men, constituting all that remained of a company of regular soldiers stationed at the Beach Barracks, which was de- stroyed, were under the ruins of the street. The loss of life among the sol- diers at the barracks must have been fully 100.

LOSS \$10,000,000.

New Orleans, Sept. 10.—The following message was received from Mr. Hays, a newspaper correspondent, well- known throughout the South: "Hous- ton, Tex., Sept. 10.—I have just arrived from Galveston by boat. The storm destroyed \$10,000,000 worth of property and 1,500 lives lost. National aid asked for quick."

CONCERN DIDN'T COME.

Montreal, Sept. 8.—Mr. Conners, of Buffalo, promised to be on hand yes- terday, but when the harbor commis- sioners met there was no word from the Buffalo promoter, and it was decided to extend the time till Tuesday. If Conners does not show up his deposit of \$50,000 will be forfeited.
