Story of Pekin
Graphically Told

By a Correspondent of the Lon-
don Times.

Chinese Duplicity and Infamy Depicted in Startling Colors—
Progress of the Allies in Their Advance on the
Capital—Expect To Be There August 12.

Shanghai, Wednesday, Aug. 1.—The
allies advanced towards Pekin today.
It is estimated that the expedition
numbers 20,000 men of all arms, with
170 guns. It is hoped to reach Pekin
on Aug. 12.

From Tien Tsin, under date of Sun-
day, says a Che Foo cable to the New
York Herald, comes a report that the
Japanese vanguard has been repulsed
with a loss of 150 killed and wounded.

THE STORY OF PEKIN.

London, Thursday, Aug. 2.—4 a.m.—
At last the story of Pekin has been
told. Dr. Morrison, in today's Times,
holds up the Chinese Government be-
fore the world as guilty and to a de-
gree of infamy and duplicity that ex-
ceeds the surmise of its worst de-
tractors. In the same dispatch he
gives a more hopeful view of the
prospects of the besieged than has
been expressed by any of the others
who have been heard from. Simultane-
ously there comes from the Belgian
charge d'affaires at Shanghai an of-
ficial statement that the allies are ex-
pected to reach Pekin in about a
week, they being 18 miles from Tien
Tsin yesterday.

THE LETTER.

Dr. George Ernest Morrison, the fa-
mous Pekin correspondent of the Times,
under date of July 21, says:

"There has been a cessation of hos-
tilities here (Pekin) since July 18,
but for fear of treachery there has
been no relaxation of vigilance. The
Chinese soldiers continued to
strengthen the barricades around the
besieged area, and also the batteries
on top of the imperial city wall, but
in the meantime they have discon-
tinued firing, probably because they
are short of ammunition. The main
body of the imperial soldiers have
left Pekin in order to meet the relief
forces. Supplies are beginning to
come in, and the condition of the be-
sieged is improving. The wounded
are doing well. Our hospital arrange-
ments are admirable, and 150 cases
have passed through the hospitals."

"The Tsung Li Yamen forwarded to
Sir Claude Macdonald a copy of the
dispatch telegraphed by the emperor
to Queen Victoria, attributing all
deeds of violence to bandits, and re-
questing her majesty's assistance to
extricate the Chinese Government
from its difficulties. The Queen's re-
ply is not stated, but the Chinese
minister in Washington telegraphs
that the United States Government
