THE WEATHER.

Toronto, Jan. 4—11 p. m.—Since last night there has been but little change in pressure over Eastern Canada, but over the lake region it has decreased and over the Northwest Territories has increased. There is now a storm center over Lake Superior moving eastward. The weather has been generally fair and cold from the lakes eastward, while in the Northwest Territories the mild weather continues.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 38°-48°; Edmonton, 38°-40°; Prince Albert, 10°-22°; Qu'Appelle, 28°-30°; Winnipeg, 8° below-8°; Toronto, 10°-18°; Montreal, 14° below-2°; Quebec, 20° below-6° below; Halifax, 22°-26°.

—Alma College reopens to-day.

—Mr. James Cox, the newly-elected mayor of Stratford, was in the city yesterday.

—Master Richard and Wm. Spicer have returned home after a short visit to friends in Melbourne.

—The local option bylaw, submitted to the electors of Lobo township on Monday, was carried by 74 majority.

—Miss Lillywhite, city, took part acceptably in the recent musical entertainment to the Masonic fraternity of Thorndale.

—Mrs. (Rev.) J. G. Scott, St. Thomas, has been presented by the members of her Sunday school class with a complete volume of "Shakespeare, His Heroes and Heroines."

—A bottle of soothing syrup played a prominent part at the final meeting of the city council last night. It had been sent to Ald. Wallis, and as each of the retiring members got up to make his farewell address the bottle was passed to him.—[St. Thomas Journal.]

—The Toronto street railway receipts for December were \$69,958, of which the city share is \$5,590. In December, 1891, the city's share was \$5,517. The mileage returns Tuesday were for 703 miles, and the amount received was \$13,963.

—Friday evening last Rev. H. C. Speller and a colored preacher by the name of McDonald, from Deland, gave temperance lectures here in the Methodist Church.

Mr. Speller is a splendid orator, his language being simply perfect. Not so with his less gifted colored brother, who "treated" on the patience of the audience with his conglomeration of English and half an hour—[Orange City (Fla.) Dispatch.]

—As already stated in these columns, Deland, Fla., where Rev. H. C. Speller is now stationed, went largely "dry" in the recent election, the temperance people carrying the county (Volusia) by a vote of 674 to 315.

The Deland Supplement says: "The Deland is due chiefly the launch, it was Deland that took the initiative, organized the county, and it was Deland people who contributed the necessary funds and did the hard work. Still there were other workers in other precincts, and to them is due no small amount of credit. Deland was jubilant when the majority of this precinct was announced. Bells were rung, and the colored friends and brothers gave vent to their feelings in exulting and cheering, hallowing yells. A squad of cadets from the university celebrated the event by parading the streets with torches, drums, etc. We have killed the open saloon; now let us murder the blind tiger."

Western School of Art.

The Western Ontario School of Art and Design, Mechanics' Institute block, Dundas street, reopened yesterday.

The school is conducted under the supervision of the Ontario Government, and is affiliated with the Ontario School of Art, having adopted the same curriculum. The term just entered on will last twelve weeks, with three lessons each week, on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, from 7 to 9 o'clock. Extra classes are conducted by the principal, Mr. J. H. Griffiths. Certificates and awards are granted. The school has an established reputation second to none, and the present term starts under auspicious circumstances.

IN ICY FETTERS.

The Niagara River Blocked—A Stagnant Load of Excursionists Cross to Youngstown.

NIAGARA, Jan. 4.—For the first time in seven years the Niagara River at this point is blocked with ice. Some time during Tuesday night the jam occurred and the severe frost cemented it firmly together. To-day a path has been staked out from Niagara to Youngstown, and people are crossing freely. E. Robinson, of Youngstown, drove a horse and sleigh with several in it over to-day. At Lewistown and Queens-town it is blocked high on the wharves.

BARRIE, Vt., Jan. 4.—Last night was the coldest of the season—32° below zero. The granite cutters were unable to work to-day, and the weather is colder to-night.

St. JOHNSBURY, Vt., Jan. 4.—The thermometer registered 30° below zero this morning—the coldest this winter.

UNITED STATES GRAIN CROPS.

Estimated Yield and Value—Low Rates for Wheat, and Plenty of It.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The Agricultural Department report shows the wheat crop to be above the average one in yield, the estimated product being 616,949,000 bushels. The rate of yield is 13.4 bushels per acre. The average value per bushel—62.4 cents—is the lowest reported, that of 1884 being 64.5 and that of 1887 being 68.1. The corn crop is short. The average yield per acre is 18.1; production, 1,628,464,000 bushels; value, \$642,146,630, averaging 39.3 cents per bushel. The estimates for oats are: Area, 27,063,835 acres; product, 661,035,000 bushels; value, \$269,253,611; yield per acre, 24.4 bushels.

Late Canadian News

Verdict Against the Government for \$178,000.

M. Kortok & Co., wholesale fur, Montreal, are offering a compromise of 15 cents on the dollar.

The Governor-General and party have arrived at Toronto and are stopping in their private car at the Union Station.

The Guelph customs returns for December were \$7,419.31, an increase of \$3,734.65 over the corresponding month of last year.

At Belleville, Samuel Crozier, the self-confessed bigamist, was on Tuesday sentenced by Magistrate Elliot to six months in the Central Prison.

A Montreal fruit merchant says the Canadian apple trade is falling off because Canadian farmers will not cultivate early fruit instead of late.

While the family were at church, the residence of Ald. Scroggie, of Guelph, was entered, the house ransacked and some \$30 or \$40 stolen. The jewelry was not interfered with.

The agents of the Guardian Fire Insurance Company of London, Eng., have received instructions not to renew policies or accept risks either in Halifax or Dartmouth after the expiry of present policies.

Dr. McEachran, of Montreal, Dominion Inspector of cattle, arrived in Ottawa on Wednesday from the Alberta district, N. W. T., where he has been inspecting the different ranches. He reports the cattle are in good shape, and will probably pull through the winter all right.

Archbishop Fabre has just issued a mandement on the occasion of the episcopal golden wedding of Pope Leo XIII., ordering special prayers in all churches during the three days preceding Feb. 19, which is the date of the 80th anniversary of the episcopal consecration of the Pope.

The Bishop of Niagara has appointed Rev. W. R. Clark, M.A., of Ancaster, to the parish of Barton and Glanford, rendered vacant through the appointment of Rev. C. R. Lee to the rectory of St. Andrew's Church, Grimsby. Rev. Mr. Lee will remove to Grimsby at an early date.

In the Exchequer Court at Ottawa Wednesday afternoon Judge Burbridge rendered judgement in the "Hard Pan" case for extras, claimed from the crown by Ibbister & Reid, contractors for the Cape Breton Railway. The firm are awarded approximately about \$173,000. Other cases will be heard Jan. 20.

LONDON, CANADA.

London and suburbs have a population of 35,000 persons.

London is situated in the garden of Canada, midway between the Niagara and the Detroit Rivers.

London is the center of nine different lines of railway, giving easy access to the whole continent, and to the lakes and seaboard.

London has direct connection with the three great Canadian lines of railway—the Grand Trunk, the Canadian Pacific, and the Michigan Central.

London contains a line of railway from the city to Port Stanley on Lake Erie.

Each day more trains arrive at and depart from London than arrive at and depart from any other Canadian city in the same time.

London's public water supply is obtained from never-failing pure springs four miles from the city. This yield is practically unlimited. London has the best drinking water on the continent.

London is an excellent health resort, as it has a lower death rate than any city of its size on the continent, and it has magnificent white sulphur baths within its limits.

London has 1 opera house and 4 public halls.

London has 13 public schools (and a number are under contract), not including kindergarten; 3 R. C. separate schools, 2 ladies' colleges, and 1 collegiate institute.

London has 1 university and 1 medical school.

London has a Conservatory of Music and a School of Education.

London has 2 public libraries.

London is an excellent center for manufacturing and commercial enterprises.

There are already established wholesale houses for groceries, hardware, drygoods, small wares, boots and shoes, drugs, crockeryware, etc. There are one more manufacturing of furniture, engines, boilers, stoves, furnaces, iron and brass foundries, carriages, burial caskets, agricultural implements, stamped tinware, railway cars, oil refining, leather, barrels, machine tools, clothing, cigars, office and school furniture, biscuits and confectionery, mirrors and beveled plate-glass, corsets, furs, beer, washing compounds, acids, woodwork of every description, etc.

London has two daily newspapers (morning and evening editions).

London has two public parks.

London has six banks and eight loan and investment associations.

London has six charitable institutions, two hospitals and seven public buildings.

London has a good street railway, which will be much extended in the next year.

London's rate of taxation is 18 mills, which includes all school rates, etc.

London's civic assets are \$2,547,798.34, and the balance of assets over all liabilities is \$422,861.19. The total assessment is \$15,333,097.

London has 44 churches, almost every religious denomination of any importance being represented.

London has markets three times weekly, the best in the west. The Great Western Fair is held for ten days in September.
