The rate of yield is 13.4 bushel per acre. Theaverage value perbushel—62.4 centz—is the lowest reported, that of 1884 being 64.5 and that of 1887 being 68.1. The corn crop is short. The average yield per acre is 13.1; production, 1,628,464,000 bushels; value, \$209,003,835 acres; product, 661,035,000 bushels; value, \$209,023,611; yield per lushel.
