THINKS LEAGUE UNNECESSARY.

Mayor Rumball Only Half Favors
Howland's Scheme.

Considers That the Present Municipal
Association Would Do if Given
Strong Support.

The proposal emanating from Mayor
Howland, of Toronto, to form a munici-
pal union for the defense of common
rights and the rights of the citizens
against the encroachments of great
corporations, is received semi-enthusi-
astically by Mayor Rumball, who favors
its aims, but considers the union un-
necessary in view of the existence
of a healthy municipal association at
the present time.

"No doubt," he says, "municipalities
are not careful enough of their own
interests. Such a union is all right,
and could doubtless do good work; but
what's the use of having two associations
for the same purpose? The one that
met here in London has the same
object, among others. Would it not be
wiser for all the municipalities in On-
tario that are not now active members
of it to take a greater interest in it,
rather than form another?"

In a symposium recently published
in the Toronto News, Mayor Vair, of
Jolt, speaks to the same effect, saying
that as the aims and objects of the
proposed league are identical with those
of the present association, he could see
no use of the two, if the municipali-
ties would make use of the present or-
ganization. Whether the above sug-
gestion is so or not, in the opinion
of Mayor Slater, of Niagara Falls, there
cannot be too much energy and atten-
tion given to this subject, "in order to
defeat what is today the curse of Can-
ada, as well as other countries."
