Four ships had spent the winter at Point Barrow, on Herschell Island. glance at a booklet just issued by man and Bononza. Eight other ships arrived last summer and announced their intention of getting out during the fall, but only two of them managed to reach the Pacific.

The others are frozen in, and he believes that a large percentage of the crews will lose their lives from starvation and scurvy.

The summer season in those waters gives the whalers only about six weeks to work, and nearly every winter some ships are obliged to stay at Herschelf Island on account of their tardiness. In 1897 sixteen ships wintered there, and 75 per cent of the crews died, either of starvation or scurvy.
