The police have been investigating the matter, but have found no clue to the identity of the child's parents. No one knows who left the suitcase in the station. It was a new one, without any marks.

## WOMEN OF RUSSIA HAVE A HARD TIME

The Police Surrounded Recent Women's Congress as If It Were an Anarchist Assemblage.

London, May 16.—Mme Zenelide Mirovitch, a delegate to the woman suffrage convention, has been telling the women of England something of the struggle in Russia against the forces of reaction.

During the liberation movement in Russia, she said, all the progressive elements declared themselves in favor of equal rights for women, and at the first duma their cause was warmly supported, and might have been carried to success had it not been for the unfortunate dissolution. But the first great victory was gained when the universities were thrown open to women in 1906.

Now the reactionists are in power, and it was only with the greatest pressure, especially from the university professors, that the present minister of education permitted the women students of 1906 to finish their studies. Harsh regulations are being made against women on all sides.

Restrictions on Marriage. The women in the postal and telegraphic service have been forbidden to marry men outside their own department. It was alleged that they might inform their husbands of the contents of telegrams—an excuse that comes badly from a department which freely opens private letters. Schoolmistresses are not admitted to schools in which unmarried schoolmistresses are serving. Pleasure excursions are forbidden to be present at rural councils. In short, the reactionaries have recognized that women were their natural enemies.

When under great pressure permission was given for the recent women's congress in St. Petersburg the programme was curtailed; men members were excluded; all criticism of the Government was, of course, forbidden. The hall was surrounded by police as if the women were criminals. A police officer was always present who had the power to stop any speaker.

But in spite of all this the woman had been able to draw such a picture of the dreadful industrial and political condition in which the mass of the Russian women were living that it became the main topic both in conversation and the press.

## NO PEONAGE IN G. T. PACIFIC CAMPS

Conditions Are as Good as in Railway Construction Camps in Canada.

St. John, N. B., May 16.—In reference to a Toronto dispatch about a letter of Prof. Carlo Cattapani, of Toronto to the Transcontinental Railway commissioners, complaining of conditions in the New Brunswick construction camps along a stretch of the railway, which he alleges that a state of anarchy exists, C. O. Foss, chief engineer of the Transcontinental construction in New Brunswick, stated today that he believed the conditions in the camps in New Brunswick were as good as railway construction camps anywhere in Canada.

The sanitary state of the camps, he had reason to believe, was good. He had issued instructions to contractors that all camps should receive medical inspection, and had received reports that the order had been complied with.

As to the claim that it was compulsory to purchase supplies from sub-contractors, that was absolutely untrue, as the men had their money, and could buy where they liked. Mr. Foss could not understand how the men meant by a system of peonage, which the dispatch referred to.

The Dominion Government had, he believed, been very lenient in coming from going to the camps, stopping them at St. John, and claiming it would be a contravention of the alien labor law to give them work in the camps. The result was that none came in at this point, but were secured from Montreal. The contractors had experienced a lot of trouble and expense, as many on their arrival, if the conditions were not just to their liking, refused to work, and left. In this way hundreds of dollars were lost, as the cost was fifteen or twenty dollars a man. It has been felt by the contractors that there should be a law compelling men as brought for work to work out the expense incurred on their behalf.

## THE WOMAN OF MYSTERY

Model of the Notorious Frank Rutledge Arrested at Chicago.

Chicago, May 15.—Mystery surrounding the identity of the fashionably-clad woman who gave her name as "Jennie Jones," when she appeared before Judge Blake today, charged with disorderly conduct, was cleared up when she admitted that she was the Miss Myrtle Norrie who figured in a sensational escape nine years ago with Frank Rutledge, known as the artist-robber, who committed suicide in a Toronto jail rather than serve a twenty years' sentence in prison.

It developed today that the young woman is the wife of the manager of a Los Angeles theatre. She refused to give her married name, but said she stopped in Chicago at 1355 Sheridan road, with her mother.

The young woman was arrested in the house of M. W. Brown, colored, 2525 Dearborn street. She was released today only after she promised to leave at once for Los Angeles. Brown and his wife also agreed to accept exile.

The "woman of mystery" readily admitted her knowledge of the Rutledge gang of safebreakers, who were captured in Chicago. She was a model for Frank Rutledge, who drew pastel pictures by day and took part in daring robberies at night.

Rutledge, Fred Lee Rice and Thos. Jones were taken back to Toronto, Canada, for trial. While the prisoners were being taken to the courtroom in a cab two women threw revolvers into the conveyance.

With their manacled hands the prisoners seized the revolvers, and a fight followed, in which the two policemen were shot fatally. Jones was mortally injured. Rutledge escaped, but was recaptured, and after he was sentenced two days later, plunged headforemost from a gallery in the jail and ended his life. Rice was hanged.

## BUSINESS REVIVAL SEEN BY J. J. HILL

Railway Magnate of Northwest Says It Is on the Up Grade.

Washington, D. C., May 16.—When James J. Hill, the northwestern railway magnate, came out of the White House today, after an extended conference with President Taft, he expressed the opinion that the business of the country, which he distinguishes sharply from trading in Wall street, was on the up-grade. He also said that if Congress would hurry up and settle the tariff matter one way or the other, there would be a steady increase in commercial prosperity.

Mr. Hill does not look for a boom, but for a healthy, although somewhat rapid, growth, and in this opinion he is in harmony with the officials of the treasury department, the inspectors of the bureau of labor, special agents of the department of commerce, and experts from the bureau of statistics and the census. Mr. Hill took occasion to express this opinion to President Taft, whom he found entirely in sympathy with his optimistic view of the business situation.

Mr. Hill's argument in favor of a speedy settlement of the tariff question was that the country is suffering from a lack of confidence in the commercial conditions are expressed with characteristic originality and directness.

"There are hundreds of thousands of people," he said, "who keep their eyes on Washington whenever there is any disturbance in the country. People who are really poor know that while commercial conditions are good, they are not created by law. ## AERIAL TORPEDOES RUN BY WIRELESS

Expected That Country Will Soon Have Six Weapons of Enormous Destructive Power.

London, May 16.—Messrs Krupp, of Essen, are supplying the money for some remarkable experiments, which are being carried out by Prof. Weichert, of the Meteorological Institute of Göttingen. Prof. Weichert has constructed a miniature aeroplane or aerial torpedo, weighing about eighty pounds, which, by means of small electric motors, has been succeeded in driving through the air at high speed.

He is now conducting a number of experiments for the purpose of ascertaining how the machine can be steered by electricity by an operator stationed safely on earth. He is guided by the system of steering submarine torpedoes by electric wires.

The extreme importance of these experiments from a military point of view is evident, and this aspect of the matter is emphasized by the subvention which Messrs. Krupp have devoted to this purpose. Judging from the results already achieved it appears probable that Germany will soon be in possession of air torpedoes which will be under the control of those who discharge them. An air torpedo of this character would be a weapon of enormous destructive power.

Prof. Weichert desires to apply his invention not only to the purpose of war, but also to scientific research, for he considers that flying machines of this type can be employed to ascertain the condition of the atmosphere at high altitudes. He is now experimenting with a flying machine of this kind, which he can direct to a high altitude by an electrical current and then bring it back to the point from which it started.
