#### GERMANY FOLLOWS GREAT BRITAIN.

While the dukes and drones are screaming "socialism!" at the unearned increment tax in the British budget, the aggressively anti-Socialist Government of the German Empire is trying to introduce the very same principle into German national finance!

A tax on unearned increment is actually in operation in 100 German municipalities. It has been a satisfactory source of local revenue, and it is now to be incorporated in the central administration.

The imperial treasury has asked the governments of the various kingdoms of Germany to furnish information to guide it in framing an unearned increment tax yielding £1,000,-000 a year, and susceptible of expansion. The Lloyd-George budget is expected to raise only £500,000 the first year, one-half of which will be remitted to the municipalities.




