DEALING WITH CRIME

Warden of the Central Prison Speaks of Crime and Its Causes.

The few who attended the public meeting held in the school room of the First Presbyterian Church last night were treated to a most interesting address on dealing with delinquents, by Dr. Gilmour, warden of the Central

Prison, Toronto.
"What we need today," he said, "is ontrol Prison, and Millman & Co., legislation that will give us control condstock, to the epileptic hospital in over delinquents while they are out of prison. It is one of the saddest of prison. It is one of the saddest facts in our work that there are more commitments between the ages of 16 and 21 than any other. There are two great classes of delinquents, the habitual and the accidental. The habitual delinquent is the man who makes a business of crime and spends a large part of his time in prison. The accidental delinquent is of the type who has lived respectably and through some has lived respectably and through some stress of circumstances falls. In the last fourteen years 9,000 men have been in the Central Prison, and 60 per cent of them were under 30 years of age.

The Causes.

"Heredity and environment have much to do with their fall. In a new country like Canada environment plays a far stronger part than heredity. dealing with juvenile delinquents I am most uncompromising enemy of institutional methods.
