WOLGAST READY FOR LAGRAVE GO

Champion Cuts Down Work When Visited By Aspirants to Title.

LAGRAVE IS IN SHAPE

Will Be Seconded by "Spider" Kelly, the Veteran Fighter, Who Knows the Business.

San Francisco, Cal., March 30.—Ad Wolgast has practically completed training for his 20-round bout with Anton Lagrave at the Auditorium Arena Friday night. At the conclusion of his work today the lightweight champion declared he was fit to the minute, and that only light exercise would be necessary to keep him on edge between now and fight time. Wolgast had planned for a rather strenuous day today, but the presence of a number of aspirants for the lightweight title who had gathered at the Seal Rock gymnasium, caused him to take things easy. Chief among the visitors was Frankie Burns, who will meet Wolgast next month.

Y.M.C.A. JUNIORS SHOW GREAT FORM

Work in Canadian Championship Events Surprises Supporters of Youngsters.

NELLES MANN LEADS

Makes Better Scores Than Seniors and Has Total of 519—The Results.

The Junior athletes of the Y. M. C. A. contested in different events for the Canadian championships last evening, and ran up scores that surprised the most optimistic of their followers. Nelles Mann led on the total with 519, and succeeded in doing the best work in broad jump, fence vault and shot-put. In the first-named event his mark was one inch better than the leading man in the senior contest of the night before. In the fence vault 30 points was considered to be the best that could be expected from the juniors, but three men ranged from 100 to 112. The total number of points by the leading three in each event was 1,506. This should take something when the final reckoning is made. On Tuesday evening next a meeting will be held to arrange plans for the summer outdoor sports.

In the eighth, with one out, the Oklahoma City pitcher selected him as a mark, and passed Corcoran to get at him.

New York, March 30.—If Attel, the featherweight champion of America, can outpoint Frankie Burns, the Jersey bantam, in 10 rounds at the National Sporting Club here tomorrow night, he will be hailed as a phenomenon.

In spite of the fact that Burns showed in his recent battle with Digger Stanley at the club that he possesses rugged strength and skill, Attel has consented to reduce himself to 118 pounds, which he must make at the ringside. The fact that he is undisputed champion at 125 pounds, and has also gone out in his class to box with the lightweights, including Pat Morris, Battling Nelson, Freddie Welsh and Tommy Murphy, is proof of the remarkable confidence he possesses in himself, and as a boxer it is conceded that he has no superior, excepting Paddy McFarland and Ben Fiske.

OFFER \$28,000 ON SHORT SHIP

Early Closing Events in Seven Cities Carry Large Purse.

Purses amounting to \$28,000 are announced for the early closing events of the Short Ship circuit in seven Michigan cities, and \$10,000 will be given in purses in thirteen cities for events to be held later. Monroe, July 27-30; Flint, July 4-7; Bay City, July 11-14; Port Huron, July 18-21; Toledo, Ohio, July 22-25; Lansing, Aug. 1-4; Alpena, Aug. 15-18; Cassar, Aug. 22-25; Thack, Aug. 29 to Sept. 1; Bay City, Sept. 4-8; Port Huron, Sept. 11-14; Marquette, Sept. 19-22; named later, Sept. 25-29.
