MYSTERIOUS SUICIDE ENGLISH MERCHANT

Body Supposed to Have Been That
of a Nobleman Has Been
Identified.

New York, Nov. 21.—From a description and a photograph of the man who registered at the Hotel Astor as Maurice Stuart and shot himself through the heart on Nov. 6, was unofficially identified yesterday as Edward Westmoreland Barrett, who had said he was the head of the company bearing his name, a perfume concern, of Oxford street, London. The body was buried about a week ago, after it had been wrongly identified as that of an English nobleman, who later was found living in an good health in the far west.

HOUSES SINK 60 FEET

Lives of Two Families Endangered by
Strange Accident at Soranton.

Soranton, Pa., Nov. 20.—Two houses sank sixty feet today into a mine cave-in in this city early today, endangering the lives of two families. Patrick J. Buckley's wife was preparing breakfast, when their house began to settle. She awoke the other members of the family and they escaped, but Warren Stephens and his wife were pinned in their house. A ladder was lowered into the cave by neighbors, and the couple were rescued as fire started in the wrecked dwellings. Adjoining buildings were slightly affected by the cave-in.

STROMBOLI ACTIVE

Village Houses Shaken by Terrible
Explosions Within the Volcano.

Naples, Nov. 20.—A correspondent at Stromboli telegraphs that at ten minutes to 8 o'clock Sunday morning a loud rumbling was heard and that at intervals of five minutes two explosions took place in the crater of the volcano. The explosions were about of equal force and shook houses in the villages.

The volcano then began to belch forth large quantities of scoriae. Flames and smoke continue to rise from the crater.

News from Western Ontario

PROVINCE TO SETTLE TILBURY OIL CASE

Big Deputation of Those In-
terested See East Kent
Member.

Chatham, Nov. 21.—The Tilbury oil men and others interested in the big case now pending in regard to drilling rights under the Lake Erie, waited on Mr. D. W. Sullivan, M.P.P., and as a result the matter will be brought to the attention of the Provincial Government. Strong representations were made that the Provincial Government had leased to A. D. Chaplin what was legally farmers' land. The original crown grants fix the southern boundary of lots at the old Talbot road, long since swallowed up by the encroachments of the lake. The farmers claim that in attempting to grant Mr. Chaplin the territory under the lake from the present water's edge, the Government was giving away their property. They claimed also that when the new Talbot road was laid out, fifty years ago, the understanding was that the farmers who gave the land for the purpose were to receive the old road as recompense. The deputation also urged that by striking salt water, the drillers might endanger the fish in the lake, while the water from the lake might also percolate to the wells, impairing their value.

Mr. Coatesworth, a member of the deputation, stated that the Government had refused him the privilege of purchasing the water lot adjoining his property. Mr. Sullivan urged that the Government at the time of the lease was probably unaware of the present conditions, and suggested that a large number of the farmers agreed. The deputation was supported by Mr. B. F. Dowd, solicitor, and Mr. J. G. Kerr, of the Volcano Oil and Gas Company.

WINGHAM POLICE ARE AFTER VAGRANTS

Will Not Allow Any Tramps
to Loiter in the
Town.

INGERSOLL DEATHS LOWEST ON RECORD

Report of Clerk Smith Shows That Town is a Very Healthy Place.

Ingersoll, Nov. 21.—Ingersoll's death rate for the year ending Nov. 15 is probably the lowest on record, at least it is the lowest since Town Clerk Smith entered upon his duties 24 years ago. A report which he has just prepared shows that there were 109 births during the year, there being 51 males and 58 females. The deaths for the same period total 79, and only two of them were caused by contagious diseases. One was due to typhoid fever and the other one to measles. Tuberculosis victims number eight. The report serves to emphasize the fact that Ingersoll is a healthy town.

FARMERS' BANK TRIAL MAY NOT BE VALID

Some Doubt as to Whether Case Should Have Been Heard Before Judge Winchester.

Toronto, Nov. 20.—The question has now arisen whether the trial of J. J. Warren and Hon. J. R. Stratton on the charge of conspiracy to obtain a certificate permitting the Farmers' Bank to start business should have been held before Judge Winchester in the county court.

At the time of the trial, the defence claimed that they had not elected where they would be tried, and therefore had a right to be tried before the county judge's criminal court. The crown prosecutor agreed that this was right if they had not elected. This morning when Judge Winchester was preparing his judgment he got word that Judge Riddell, at the assize court, wanted to see him, and then learned from his lordship that Messrs. Warren and Stratton had indeed elected to be tried at a previous sitting of the assize court.

"I tried them on the understanding that they had not elected to be tried on any indictment basis," said Judge Winchester. "It appears that their election is indicated on the indictment I asked if the defendants had pleaded or elected, and I was told they had not."

STRIKE AT MAGOG

Four Hundred Employees of Dominion Textile Company Out.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—Four hundred employees of the Dominion Textile Company, at Magog, went out on strike this morning. The men demand an increase of ten per cent, and declare themselves confident that the company will yield. All the mills of the company may be affected if the strike should continue long, as the Magog printing mill supplies all the other mills of the company, and it is this department that is most affected.

REMEMBER GOOD WOMAN.

Montreal, Nov. 20.—The fifty-second anniversary of the taking of the religious vows of the Rev. Sister Mary of St. Helene Lariviere will be celebrated tomorrow at the Congregation of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd of Fullum street. She was the first sister superior of the St. Marie Asylum, where she took charge on April 30, 1870, having been appointed by late Bishop Fabre. She remained there for 38 years.

Sister Lariviere was born in Montreal on March 23, 1838. She entered the novitiate in July, 1854.
