

THERE ANY PERIL?

Opposition Leader in Senate Thinks Contribution Policy Would Be No Policy at All.

Ottawa, Nov. 26. - The debate on he address in reply to the speech from the throne was commenced in the Senate today, three speeches being made. The first was by Senator Daniel, of St. John, who moved the address; the second by Senator Rufus Pope, of Compton, Que., who seconded it, and the third by Sir George Ross, the new leader of the Opposition in the upper chamber, who eloquently foreshadowed the line he would take when the naval proposals of the Government came before the Senate.

Sir George, in opening, referred to his selection as leader of the Opposition, thanking his associates for the honor, and expressing the hope that he would be able to discharge the duties in a manner which would facilitate the business of the country which came before the Senate. He referred to the interest of the country in the trip through Canada made by the Duke and Duchess of Connaught. The success of the journey was a matter of great satisfaction. The Naval Policy.

It was to the naval policy, he prohave looked forward with greatest interest after being called to conference by His Royal Highness the Governor-General. The speech from the throne announced that four of the ministers during the summer had conferred with the admiralty to prepare the naval program of Can-ada. Four men at least had the secret of the policy locked up in their bosoms. In Britain, Premier Borden had made speeches on naval ald, and he and his ministers had made speeches after returning to Canada without disclosing the policy.

The measure was promised, and would soon be brought down. Before the proposed measure was passed, the basis on which the aid was to be given should be fully disclosed to the members of Parliament, and the Senate. The address, after saying that four ministers had conferred with the British authorities, added "conditions had been disclosed which rendered it imperative," that Canada should give naval aid. Imperative was a strong word. What was the matter with Old England? Had she no more sailors to man her ships? Had she no longer the ex-chequer with which to build and maintain her fleets? If these were the conditions which rendered aid imperative, let Parliament know, and out of her abundance Canada would give aid cheerfully and take a part of the burden from the weary Titan. But before Parliament gives it must know the facts of the case.
