FIFTY THOUSAND VICTIMS. Rome, Jan. 14-8:45 a.m.-The victims of the earthquake disaster, according to latest reports received here, number that telegrams received from the provabout 50,000, dead and wounded.

The earthquake zone, so far as can be athered here, extends for a distance of searly three hundred miles, from below in the south to Ferrara in the north, and practically across the entire width of the country in the district indicated. The country to the east and southeast of Rome suffered the most apparently, for reports of loss of life and damage to property come from all over this district.

Avezzano, a town with 12,000 inhabtants 63 miles east of Rome, seems to have been the centre of the disturbance and this place, with a number of nearbtowns and villages, is reported as having been destroyed. Great loss of life occurred at Avezzano and its vicinity.
