# De Valera Quits Presidency of Irish Republic POLICE THINK

## EXPECTED TO HASTEN PEACE

Early Ratification of Anglo-Irish Agreement Is Predicted.

NEW MINISTRY FORMED

Majority of Dail Members Favor Lloyd George's Proposals.

London, Jan. 6 .- Dissatisfied with the apparent approval at an early date of the Irish peace treaty by the Dail Eireann, Eamon de Valera has resigned the presidency of the Irish republic, and a new Dail ministry is being formed.

The removal of de Valera as head of the republic, it is believed, will do much toward hastening approval of Premier Lloyd George's offer of ion status to Erin.
