MONTREAL, Sept. 19.—Alienists, possibly from Scotland Yard, will be called in to form a special commission which will examine Father Delorme to decide finally whether or not he is insane. This question is reported to be the serious consideration of the provincial authorities, and is being discussed with keen interest by Father Delorme's closest friends and aids.

MANY OFFER SERVICES FOR WAR AT KINGSTON

KINGSTON, Sept. 19.—At the headquarters of Military District No. 3 many offers have been received to join units for service in the Near East. Col. A. E. Bywater, commanding the Hastings and Prince Edward Regiment offers to raise a battalion, and states that this battalion would be ready to embark, if required, within ten days from the receipt of the acceptance of his offer.

Major Mooney, commanding the 3rd Gananogue Battery, reports his battery as ready and willing to participate in any military activities which may take place.

The local Great War Veterans' Association has wired the minister of militia, offering to raise a battalion of ex-service men in Kingston.

DECLARES ONTARIO WILL VOTE ON WINE LICENSES

TORONTO, Sept. 19.—The Toronto Telegram today publishes the following:

"Another referendum in the immediate future, in which Ontario will be asked whether the province desires to give standard hotels throughout the country the sale of light wine and beer was forecasted today, to follow the deliberations of the special committee of the Legislature dealing with the hotel situation."

15,000,000 BUSHELS OF WESTERN WHEAT SOLD

WINNIPEG, Sept. 19.—More than fifteen million bushels of wheat were marketed in districts served by the Canadian Pacific Railway from the commencement of the crop movement to Sept. 15, it is announced today. This is an increase of about 2,500,000 bushels over the corresponding period of last year. To the same date more than two million bushels of coarse grains were handled.

NOVA SCOTIA MAN TAKES OWN LIFE

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 19.—Frank Chute, formerly manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Yarmouth, N. S., who had been suffering for some time from a severe breakdown and had recently been released from a sanatorium, committed suicide late yesterday afternoon by shooting himself with a high-powered hunting rifle at Nasonworth, York County.

ORDER 12 BOSTON FIRMS TO TAKE OUT TICKERS

NEW YORK, Sept. 19.—Stock tickers and wire connections with stock exchange houses of 12 non-member Boston brokerage firms were ordered removed today by the committee on quotations on the New York Stock Exchange on the ground that they had been guilty of practices considered detrimental to the exchange.

FACES TRUE BILL FOR DEATH OF HOUSEKEEPER

TUSKETT, N. S., Sept. 19.—The grand jury returned a true bill in the case of Omar Roberts, charged with the murder of his nineteen-year-old housekeeper, Flora Gray, at Kempsville in August last, by pouring gasoline upon her and lighting it.

The trial proper will probably get under way this afternoon.

G. T. R. RECEIPTS DECREASE.

MONTREAL, Sept. 19.—Grand
