RAIN HALTS NORTH RANDALL RACING

Change of Drivers Fails To Aid Tramp Cuts in 2:20 Trotting Event.

POSTPONE FEATURE

North Randall, Cleveland, Aug. 21.—Rain, which had fallen lightly all afternoon, came down in torrents after the finish of the 2:14 trot, and caused a postponement until tomorrow of the fourth and deciding heat of the 2:08 class pacing, the Forest City \$3,000 purse, the feature of today's Grand Circuit card here.
Disheartened with the way Tramp Cuts trotted in the second mile, when he finished third in five seconds slower than was hung up when he won the first heat, the judges replaced Driver Marvin Thornton with Vic Fleming, but this made no change in the result of the race, as Tramp Cuts could not do better than fourth in the

third heat, and was a poor third in the race-off.

LINEUP OF U. S. DAVIS CUP TEAM ANNOUNCED

Committee's Choice of Richards Occasions Surprise in Tennis Circles.

New York, Aug. 21.—The U. S. team that will defend the Davis Cup, international team tennis trophy, will be composed of R. Norris Williams, 2nd, of Philadelphia, captain; William T. Tilden, 2nd, of Philadelphia, U. S. national champion; William M. Johnston, of San Francisco, world's champion; and Vincent Richards of Yonkers, N.Y.
This team, which will oppose Australia, survivor of the 1922 preliminary play in the challenge round at Forest Hills, N. Y., Aug. 31, Sept. 1 and 3, is the same as that which successfully defended the historic trophy against the Australians last year. The selection was made late today by the Davis Cup committee of the U. S. Lawn Tennis Association.
The committee's choice of Richards, No. 1 ranking star, occasioned some surprise because of the fact that the youngster had abandoned his national doubles team partnership with Wulden. In the 1922 Davis Cup challenge round in the United States sustained his only defeat when Richards and Tilden were beaten in the doubles by Gerald Patterson and Pat O'Hara Wood.
Johnston and Tilden, who probably will bear the brunt of the singles play, will represent this country for the fourth successive year. They have never been beaten in the singles.

HARVARD-YALE PLAYERS OUST FRENCH NET STARS

Brookline, Mass., Aug. 21.—The two Australian Davis Cup tennis teams won second matches, but the three French players were eliminated in today's encounters in the United States national doubles tournament here. The United States team of R. M. Williams II, and Watson Washburn and Clarence J. Griffin and William M. Johnston came through handily.
The most thrilling match of the day was the defeat of Vincent Richards and Dean Mather at the hands of Manuel Alonso and Wallace F. Johnson in four sets, 4-7, 7-6, 6-3, 7-5.
In the nature of upsets were the victories of the Australian club team of John D. McInnis and E. W. Schleutinger over the western champions, Wes Brock and Hennehy, and the defeat of Rene Lacoste and Jacques Brugnon of France by the Harvard-Yale combination of W. W. Ingram and Arnold W. Jones.

The draw at the London Rowing Club Scotch gloublers will be held open until 3 p.m. Bowling will commence at 4 p.m.

MILLIONAIRE PATRON COMES TO BOSS FIRPO

Horatio Lavelle, Argentine Lightweight, Explodes Drug Clerk Story.

New York, Aug. 21.—Horatio Lavelle, millionaire Argentine sportsman and patron of Luis Angel Firpo, arrived today aboard the American Legion from Buenos Aires to take charge of the South American pugilist's campaign of training for his title match with Jack Dempsey Sept. 14 at the Polo Grounds.
Senior Lavelle, accompanied by several other ring enthusiasts from the Argentine, was met by Firpo. After a short conference with Tex Rickard, promoter of the championship match, at Madison Square Garden, Lavelle and Firpo departed for Atlantic City, where the challenger has established quarters. Active workouts will be started tomorrow, it was said.
The story that Firpo served an apprenticeship as a drug clerk in Buenos Aires before beginning his ring career was exploded by other arrivals from the Argentine. Before Firpo took up boxing, they said, he was simply a manual laborer. He has been a stevedore, boot-black, and at one time washed bottles in a drug store, whence originated the drug clerk legend.

Lavelle, 28 years old, a millionaire owner of a wheat and grazing plantation near Buenos Aires. Lavelle won the amateur lightweight championship of Latin America at the Brazilian centennial exposition last year.

WESTERN TEAMS HAVE MONOPOLY ON TROPHIES

Vancouver, Aug. 21.—Owing to the inability of Eastern Canadian teams to compete, as their league schedules do not terminate until late in September, only Western Canadian clubs will participate in the play-off for the Dominion amateur baseball championship and the Gale Trophy this season. Secretary Smith of the Canadian Association has notified the local association to this effect, and Secretary Jones has wired the Prairie associations, suggesting play-offs between British Columbia and Alberta, and Saskatchewan and Manitoba. LUIS ANGEL FIRPO AGREES TO BATTLE HARRY WILLS

New York, Aug. 21.—Irish Johnny Curtin, Jersey City, featherweight, was seriously injured in the fourth round of a bout with Frankie Jerome of New York tonight when he fell from the ring, striking his head on a chair. Doctors, fearing a skull fracture, sent him to St. John's Hospital for examination. Curtin was trying to evade a blow from Jerome, and as he ducked he leaned backward, and his head going under the top rope surrounding the ring, he lost his balance and toppled headfirst to the ringside.
