SLOGGETT TALKS ON TARIFF ISSUES

Former Candidate Endorses St.
Thomas Mayor As Man
of Integrity.

St. Thomas, Oct. 8.—Mayor Sloggett, Liberal nominee for West Elgin, invaded one of the Tory strongholds tonight at Chestnut Grove, near the Conservative candidate's home. The reception he received would have warmed the heart of the most pessimistic voter and the little school-house resounded with cheers when Mayor Sloggett closed his address.

R. A. Kerr acted as chairman for the meeting. Mr. Kerr is a farmer and Ford agent in the district. Speaking as a farmer, he said that the prices paid for wheat, fallow, hogs and dairy products was the best in years, while the quantity produced exceeded that of other years. As a dealer in cars he stated the car he sold cost Canadians at least \$250 more than it did the Americans, although it was built in the dominion. He predicted that if the Mclellan program of high tariff was carried out the Fordson tractor would advance in price, from \$150 to \$200.

The second speaker was William Tolmie, former federal candidate. Mr. Tolmie asked the electors to get away from politics and get down to principle. He spoke of the economic administration of the King government, and urged the voters to vote for a government that had already shown a careful administration and fair-minded platform. "Speaking as a man," said Mr. Tolmie, "I want a candidate who is possessed of fighting qualities, a desire to serve his constituency in an intelligent way and to be just in all national problems. I know Mr. Sloggett to be honest and a man of integrity."

Walter Stott, a Rodney young man and a student of political economy, spoke of the immigration question. He said that Canada had over 30 per cent of all the immigrants from the British Isles, and despite the dust screen that the Tories were stirring up, there was practically no many returning to Canada as there were crossing the border from the dominions.

Mr. Sloggett again reiterated his statement of the other night, to the effect that a tariff for revenue was the only sane issue. He favors a tariff question as it will best effect the Maritimes, the West and Ontario, and to apply such judiciously. He spoke of Mr. King as a man skilled in political economy, a student of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and possessed of degrees which made him the logical leader of a virgin nation.

MEIGHEN DENIES MAKING STATEMENT

Stated He Never Mentioned the
Judgment of the Railway
Commission.

Toronto, Oct. 8.—Speaking at Vancouver last night, Mr. Meighen, in referring to an election pamphlet entitled, "Who's the Friend of B. C.?" denied he had made certain statements contained in such pamphlet, which claimed to be based on despatches of the Canadian Press from St. John, N.B., and Halifax, N. S. In particular, Mr. Meighen stated he had never mentioned the judgment of the railway commission.

The Canadian Press report of Mr. Meighen's meeting in St. John contains no allusion whatever to the railway commission. Speaking at Halifax on September 15, Mr. Meighen was preceded by Senator Robertson, who was then reported by the Canadian Press as saying: "The government has made concessions to the Progressives which had cost the country a good deal. The latest blow which the government had struck at the rest of the country came with the recent judgment granting reduced rates on grain and flour to British Columbia. This meant a further tax of fifteen millions a year on the Canadian railways. This was in addition to a prior gift to the prairies which cost the railways 26 millions."

THINK FORD IS MAKING NEW ROTARY SNOWPLOW

Hailey, Idaho, Oct. 8.—Automobilists of Idaho are led to believe that Henry Ford soon will put upon the market a rotary snowplow that will make winter automobile travel possible in many sections where winter travel hitherto has been limited to skis and snowshoes.
For two years Ford employees have been experimenting with a rotary plow which was worked on a tractor. It operates much the same as the great plows used by western railroads.
