HEAVIEST RAINFALL IN YEARS.

Toronto, Nov. 13.—This portion of Ontario was today being further soaked with intermittent downpours after a heavy rainfall throughout the night. The fall in Toronto and district was 2.06 inches up to noon today according to dominion observatory officials, which was the heaviest rainfall in six consecutive hours for the last six years.

SEARCH FOR M-1 FRUITLESS, ADMIRALTY ABANDONS HOPE

Divers Are Unable To Work at Depth of Supposed Wreck.

MINE SWEEPER OUT
Fresh Attempt Will Be Made Today To Locate Submarine Monitor.

Associated Press Despatch.
Plymouth, Eng., Nov. 13.—All hope of rescuing any of the 68 officers and men of the submarine monitor M-1, which disappeared off the Devon coast yesterday morning while engaged in manoeuvres in the company of a number of other submarines, has been abandoned.

It is believed the sunken craft has been located in 225 feet of water off Start Point, and a last effort will be made early tomorrow morning by a mine sweeper to get in definite contact with the boat. Divers, however, are unable to work at such depths, and the possibility of bringing up any of the crew alive is regarded as hopeless, although two divers volunteered to make the attempt when the discovery of the resting-place became known.

Arrangements have been made for a memorial service at Portland dockyard church Sunday, dashing the last hopes of the wives and mothers whose men went down into the sea. In one of Britain's largest submarines, whose loss is one of the most tragic chapters in the country's submarine experience. Through last night and today, a fleet of rescue ships searched the waters ceaselessly within a wide radius of Start Point. At 2 o'clock this afternoon, a wreck was discovered, which despite the fact that the channel is strewn with wrecks, is believed to be the missing submarine. The mother ship, Maidstone, with Rear-Admiral Haggard commanding the submarine flotilla, on board, is proceeding to the scene tonight, but the admiral has no expectation that any of the men are alive, for he is certain signals would have been received.

The admiralty has not officially announced the location of the wreck, but the speed with which the names and addresses of the officers and crew were announced, is taken as indication that the navy officials have given up hope of rescue. No explanation for the disaster is offered, the officials insisting that the ship was seaworthy.

THREE ARE KILLED BY POWDER BLAST

VISITOR AMONG DEAD

The dead are: Charles Mathieu and M. Trudeau, employees, and A. McLean, who was a visitor to the plant.

BRITISH LABOR LEADERS TO BOYCOTT MUSSOLINI

Italian Premier Reported Going to England For Signing of Locarno Pact.

Associated Press Despatch.
London, Nov. 13.—British Labor leaders and Labor members of Parliament, says the Westminster Gazette, intend to boycott Premier Mussolini of Italy if he comes to London to sign the Locarno security pact and will not attend any function in his honor to which they may be invited. The paper adds that others may associate themselves with the action of labor.

Charles G. Ammon, formerly parliamentary secretary for the admiralty, is quoted as saying that the British public generally ought to endorse such an attitude and protest against Mussolini coming to England "in view of his suppressing liberty of the people and press."

A. J. Cook, secretary of the Miners' Federation, says that the trade unionists can have nothing to do with Mussolini, and declares he will put every obstacle in the way of recognition of the Italian premier in Great Britain.

There is considerable doubt as to whether Mussolini intends to come to London. The recent announcement that he was to take part in the signing ceremonies has been denied and reasserted in the last few days, but no official statement has been issued.

Ingersoll Man Shoots Big Eagle
Bird of Baldhead Type Measures Six Feet From Tip of Wings.

Ingersoll, Nov. 13.—A baldhead eagle was shot today in the Thamesford district by Hugh McLeod of this town. The eagle, which is believed to be a young one, measures six feet from tip to tip of wing. PREMIER KING TAKES REST.
Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Premier Mackenzie King has left Ottawa for a brief rest before commencing preparations for the opening of parliament next month. No cabinet meetings will take place during the remainder of the week. The premier will return next week.

Many Canadians Return From U.S.

Windsor, Nov. 13.—Canadians are still returning from the United States in large numbers, according to immigration totals obtained today from Orval G. Adams, inspector of immigration in the Windsor district. More than half of the 623 Canadians who entered Canada through the ports of Windsor and Walkerville last month were former Canadians. It was learned that 72 Americans and 63 former residents of the land of the Maple Leaf entered the dominion and at Walkerville the number of Americans was 41. The admissions and rejections for the two ports are as follows: Windsor 563 admissions and 328 rejections; Walkerville 72 admissions and 63 rejections. The totals are admissions 635; rejections 491.

INMATES OF JAIL NOW LIVING HIGH

Sheriff Orders New Menu Put Into Effect at County Institution.

MILK FOR BREAKFAST

Woodstock, Nov. 13.—Today Sheriff McGhee issued orders for the new regulations with regard to jail diet to go into effect in the local institution. Undreamed-of luxuries for prisoners are now on the bill of fare. In the future prisoners will have for breakfast porridge with sweet milk or syrup and bread; for dinner, meat, bread and potatoes on three days of the week; potatoes, bread and soup on two days, and vegetable soup and bread on other two days. Boiled rice, milk, or jam and bread or porridge with milk or syrup and bread, to be varied, is the scale for supper.

Sentenced Today.
Two more of the gang arrested last week by County Constable Hill, following a number of robberies throughout the county, appeared in court today. Edward Taylor of Mount Pleasant, Brant County, at whose home a large quantity of stolen goods had been recovered, pleaded guilty to receiving, and was sentenced to one year in the Guelph reformatory. RECORD POLLS AT TODAY'S AUSTRALIAN ELECTIONS

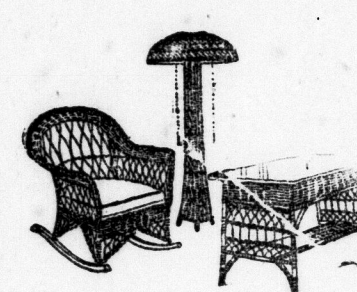

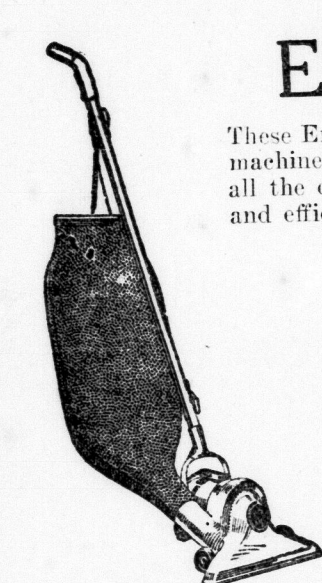
