

Boyle, despite the fact that he "spiked first" when at bat, but still of late had been getting his ration of hits that way; that he couldn't seem to resist trying to pilfer the plate, with or without instructions apparently; that he was a poor mark to shoot at on first especially for strange infielders and that his emotional outbursts had a tendency to upset the poise of the infield at critical junctures, was, to many fans, the most valuable first-sacker in the league. He and Kuhn used to be compared frequently, the latter personifying the slugging type so much in demand in baseball of late. In just the matter of straight value expressed in hits, there were lots who believed knocking down sure hits was just as valuable to a team as losing hits and then having to make them up at bat.

. . . . Ben White, Vic Fleming and Nat Ray top the Grand Circuit drivers, and all are Canadians. The New York Herald calls attention to the fact that the first man to drive a horse in 2:00 or better was Dave McClary of London, Ont. W. H. Goher, secretary of the National Trotting Association, and himself a Canadian, claims the late Andy McDowell, driver of Alix 2:03%, for the nation to the north, though it has been said that he was born in western New York; Nat Ray, of Peter Earl and Peter the Brewer fame, certainly comes from Canada. Others now active are W. T. Crozier one of the big winners in the Bay State Circuit; Harry Stinson of Brant ford, who drives The Toddler, 2:03; Dave Warman, the trainer of Penrod 2:1314, and William Hodson, the trainer of Shawnee, 2:03 14.

Charles Wegner, who invaded the Grand Circuit with his big brown mare Phyllis, 2:151/2, 40 years ago this summer, and "downed the gang" at Pittsburg, Buffalo and Boston; George Langs, who devastated Detroit and Cleveland some ten years later with that deceptive-looking pot-bellied stallion Alvin, 2:1314; Cope Stinson, the father of Harry, who developed Patron, 2:1414, the great three-year-old trotter of 1885; Ike Hodgins, of Little Billy (alias Monitor) notoriety in the late '70's; David B. Herrington, long the superintendent and trainer of Jacob Ruppert's stud and stable; Havelock James, who swept the Central New York Circuit with Fides Stanton, 2:154, about 30 years ago; William Fleming, who made a telling trip through the Grand Circuit with the pacer Joe Patchen II., and George McPherson, who came out of the fastnesses of Canada with the great pacer Angus Pointer some 20 years ago. The late Dan McEwen, also of London. Ont., was another Canadian reinsman who made Grand Circuit history.
