

Big Shawmut From the Orient

Monster Steamship Reaches Victoria Early on Sunday Morning.

Brings Interesting Band of Wild Philippine Warriors and Musicians.

Early Sunday morning the huge steamer Shawmut, of the Boston Steamship Company's line, arrived at the ocean docks from the Philippines and China and Japan, with a cargo, about fifty tons of which were passengers, including some of the most interesting people from the Philippines and the Asiatic mainland.

Forward, in the stowage, were three hundred natives of the Philippines, bound to the St. Louis exhibition under a contract of the Philippine Commission of Northern Luzon, and Mr. Healey, a big, jolly Irishman, the manager of the ship, who has been in the Philippines for some time, showed a representative of the Colonist through the stowage, which presented an extraordinary sight, the wild-looking people, sitting up in their berths, smoking, men, women and children, smoking either pipe or cigarette.
