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EXCLUSION ORATORS INCITING TO RIOT

Proceedings at Meeting to Form Branch in Vancouver Suburb

The meeting of the Mayor, Council and members of the Asiatic Exclusion League which was held last night in the hall of the Asiatic Exclusion League at 1501 Hastings street, was held in the name of an "open" meeting but was really a meeting of the Asiatic Exclusion League and its members.

It was a few minutes after eight o'clock when the meeting started. The speaker was Mr. George Payne, who stated that the object of the meeting was to organize a branch of the Asiatic Exclusion League and inform the people of that section of the city how they were being treated by their public officials and how the Oriental invasion was to be stopped.

Mr. Payne stated that the Asiatic Exclusion League was the only organization that had made certain statements that were not true, that he was going to defend himself. He said that he was going to defend himself against the refusal of the city hall to the white men or of leading it to the Japanese.

Several persons in the rear of the hall started to cheer. Mr. Payne said that he did not discharge his Japanese help, and why he was at such a meeting.

Rev. St. George Buttram of Holy Trinity church, Fairview, spoke at some length against the invasion of the Japanese into Canada. He said that it was scandalous the way the provincial government was treating the white laborers and not attempting to "Just wait a few days."

Mr. Payne advised those present to use peaceful methods. He said that he knew that such scenes as occurred last September would not be repeated.

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NEW ORGANIZATION FOR U.S. BUSINESS

National Council of Commerce Formed at New York Meeting

Washington, Dec. 5.—The national council of commerce, with a membership of 250, has been organized by the National Council of Commerce at a meeting in New York.

The meeting was attended by delegates of chambers of commerce, boards of trade and other organizations. The council is organized to promote closer cooperation between the department and the commercial bodies of the United States.

Gustav H. Schwab, of New York, was made chairman, and a committee was appointed to arrange for the council's first meeting.

The organization will consist of two departments: a national council of commerce and an advisory committee, each to be selected by the council.

From 1922 to 1937, inclusive, the Standard Oil company has accumulated a surplus of \$288,186,375. Of that amount nearly \$195,000,000 was accumulated from 1922 to 1927, inclusive.
