## LITTLE MONEY SPENT IN RESTIGOUCHE CO.

In Answer to Questions by Messrs. LaBilios and Currie Figures Given.

### LITTLE BRIDGE WORK

FREDERICTON, Mar. 3.—Today the much expected Valley Road resolution is coming before the House. This is Mr. Tweeddale's resolution confirming approval of the attitude of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in regard to the proposed road and declaring in favor of the operation of the line as a part of the Intercolonial. It is quite probable that the discussion on the resolution will be a somewhat lengthy one and different amendments may possibly be introduced.

All that is certain now, however, is that the Opposition stands firmly for the construction of the road for its operation by the Dominion Government as a part of Intercolonial.

In this way the interests of the people of the province as a whole will be best advanced and safeguarded. Mr. Byrne, for instance, has found out that during the past year the amount of work done on the Bathurst (over) bridge was \$170,846; on the Dufferin Bridge \$111,607; on the Eliza Bridge, New Bedford, \$434,441; on the Chamberlain Bridge, \$802,021; on the Lower Bridge, \$400,000; \$235,820. In the case of each of these bridges the work was done by day's work. No tenders were called for.

Mr. Currie has found out that from May 1st, 1909, to the opening of the present session, \$119,000 was paid by the Public Works department for the repair of roads in Restigouche. The different parishes—Bathurst, \$25,549; Eldon, \$41,040; Durham, \$32,400; Dalhousie, \$25,825; Addison, \$102,411.

Hon. Mr. LaBilios has learned that in Kent county between May 1st and the opening of the present session the sum spent for the repair of roads was \$201,239. Kent County people, it is evident, are not so much in need of the treatment given them by the Public Works Department as compared with the treatment given the people of the much larger county of Restigouche. Mr. John Currie, by the way, received \$418,880 during the time under discussion.

They say that these springs etc., in the human body, are the principle in the parish of Inverness in Gloucester County who have been looking for the construction of the road, have decided upon. Some of the expenditure revealed upon was \$100,000 for the bridge, a day or so ago Mr. Somers asked the government if it was the intention to build the bridge. His heart was cheered when the answer given was "Yes." But all was spoiled by the answer to his second question, "if so, when?" The answer to this was "The date has not been decided upon." Some savor day, apparently, if by any accident this government should be continued in power, Hon. During 1909 the payment advanced on account of selling the bridge, Restigouche county, according to the official report by Hon. Mr. Morrissey, totalled \$682,564. In the little county of Albany in the same time the similar expenditure totalled \$225,600.99. It will be seen that the figures are somewhat in favor of Albany.

In answer to an inquiry Hon. Mr. Morrissey showed that since the beginning of the present fiscal year, there has been paid out of the ordinary revenue for the building and repair of bridges in Restigouche \$218,185. In answer, during the same time, there has been paid \$392,200. Thus the total paid in Restigouche during the last fiscal year and so far in the present fiscal year has been \$1,115,725. In the same time Albany received the modest sum of \$21,918.89. Apparently the government has a safe spot in the budget for one of their counties and the "Fountain" of Gloucester is really one.

Mr. Currie wants to know who the game warden is in Restigouche and what territory he covers respectively. He is also drawing attention to the extraordinary destruction of game in the county and is asking if it is the intention of the government to appoint a chief game warden with headquarters at Campbellton, better to protect game in Restigouche.

Another thing Mr. Currie wants to know is who paid the sum of money on railway tie cut on government lands in Restigouche during 1909 and how much was the total collected.

This school book policy certainly promises to cost the people a neat amount of money. True, they get the books a little cheaper than formerly, but Hon. Mr. Fleming has admitted that already the government has met with loss in the operation of the policy, and of course, ultimately the people have to bear the loss. Two Railway Trains Carried into Canyon, Eighty-two are Missing.

### UNDER TONS OF SNOW

FREDERICTON, Wash. Mar. 3.—It is now almost certain that the death toll in the avalanche that carried away two Great Northern Railway trains and several locomotives will total 82. Few believe that any of the 67 missing will be found alive, as it is forty-eight hours since they were buried beneath the tons of snow and ice and twisted wreckage that swept over the ledge of high line and dropped in a heap to the bottom of the canyon two hundred feet below.

## LOCAL OPTION PETITIONS RECEIVED

Council Dealt With Matter and Poll Will be Held.

### TENDER RECEIVE

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening, March 2nd, at 7 o'clock. Mayor McLean, Messrs. Murray, and George McLean, Miller, Richards, Andrew and McLeannan being present.

A letter was read from Chief of Police Cameron, stating that he had been employed for him in the 80-foot mine, which is to come up for trial next Tuesday before the Supreme Court. After some discussion it was thought advisable to have the Solicitor's opinion on the matter before action was taken.

The Clerk submitted the tender received for clearing out Smith Lane from Stephen Hartman, the only one received. The figure mentioned was \$161.60. The tender was referred to the Water and Sewerage Committee. The local option petition from Ward one, two and three were laid before the Council by the Clerk, accompanied by the declaration in each case as required by law proving the genuineness of the signatures and that the petitions were signed by at least one quarter of the rate-payers in each ward. The petitions were received in due form and the request for a vote granted in each ward.

Coun. McLean brought up the matter of the purchase of a piece of land from A. F. Chamberlain for an almshouse site. He stated that Mr. Chamberlain desired to have the matter closed but that some arrangements should be made to have it laid over until after the meeting of the committee appointed by the County Council to consider the almshouse question.

A number of accounts were passed after which the Council adjourned.
