Biography of the Deceased, Mr. Clarke was born at Three Rivers, Que, on March 20, 1829. He was a son of Henry Clarke and Ellen Armstrong, both of whom came from Midhill, county of Fermanagh, Ireland. Mr. Clarke now resolved to carry on business for himself, and in ten months after bis arrival here he bought out the business of R. Dean & Co. Although he had little capital at his command, he had industry and perseverance, and the result is that he soon was at the head of one of the largest trunk manufacturing establishments of America, and one of the most solid and enterprising of Toronto's citizens. Although an active man in his own business, yet Mr. Clarke found some time to devote to public affairs. For eight years he was a director of the Mechanics' astitute; was alderman for St. George's ard in 1879, and for St. Andrew's Ward for the years 1881, 1882 and 1883. He was chairman of the Court of Revision in 1881, and of the Executive Committee in 1883, and eagain in 1883. He was elected in 1883 and again in 1883. He was elected in 1883 and again in 1883. He possessed an active and practical mind, was fairly well read and kept himself posted on all the leading questions of the day, in so far as they came under the purview of politics.
